Order New Walks—Allow Accounts and Transact Other Business.

Yale, June 1, 1896.

Council met in regular session, President McColl in the chair. Trustees present, Beecher, Wallace, Wharton, High and Griswold.

Minutes of last regular and intervening special meetings read and approved.

Petition of Geo. A. Mann and others for sidewalk on south side of North street received and read.

Petition of C. Andrae & Sons and others for sidewalk from Andrae St. north, east on south side of First street to F. & P. M. R. R. right of way thence along south side of said right of way to Main street, received and read.

Moved by Wallace and supported by Beecher that the Street Commissioner be instructed to build a sidewalk 4 ft. wide from Main street along the south side of F. & P. M. R. R. right of way to the intersection of said right of way with First street.—Carried.

Moved by Wallace and supported by Wharton that a sidewalk 4 feet wide be ordered built on the south side of First street from Andrae street north, east to the intersection of First street with F. & P. M. R. R. right of way, and that clerk give owners of abutting property to said sidewalk 5 days notice to build said walk.—Carried.

Moved by Beecher and supported by High that a sidewalk 4 feet wide be ordered built from the east side of

Jas. Brown's lot, thence running east on the south side of North street to the east side of Mrs. L. McDuff's lot and that the clerk give the owners of abutting property to said sidewalk 5 days notice to build said walk.—Carried.

Moved by Beecher and supported by Griswold that assessment roll as reviewed by Board of Review be accepted and that the Assessor be ordered to spread \$855.52 as general tax and \$427.76 as highway tax on the rolls.—Carried.
