An Incendiary's Work.

About eleven o'clock on Saturday evening our townspeople were aroused by the shrill cry of fire and the clanging of the fire bell. A look toward the north-east part of the village showed the bright flames leaping upward, and a quick investigation made known the fact that the old unoccupied house of Jesse Terrell was burning. Nothing could be done to save the building which was certainly set on fire by some scoundrel for some purpose of his own.

On Wednesday morning at 1:30 many were awakened by the ringing of the church bells and the dread cry of fire again broke upon the air. This time the fire was found to be in the house lately occupied by David McArthur, but now being empty and owned by C. R. Holden. The building is close to the old Commercial house on Main street, and in the minds of a great many the object of this incendiary seems to have been the destruction of the Commercial house and probably Palmer's store, all frame buildings. The McArthur house was an old land mark, being built at Old Brockway in 1871. When the fire engine was brought on the spot it was found that the bottom of the valve had been removed and of course the engine was useless for a time. The bucket brigade, however, got in noble work and saved the hotel. In the fire of Saturday night the bell had been broken and the matter had not been attended to until after the second fire. The loss attending either of these fires was not very heavy but we would prefer the absence of both.

OBITUARY.

Vincent Ferguson, whose death occurred last week Wednesday, was a pioneer of Brockway township, having moved here about forty-two years ago. He was born in Sidney, Ont., in 1819 and was therefore about 79 years old. He was of Dutch-Irish descent and the eldest of ten children. In 1845 he was united in marriage to Mary Chisholm, who bore him nine children and who has now been dead a good many years. The first child died in infancy, the second, James, enlisted in the war and has never been heard from since. Seven are living. Mr. Ferguson came to Yale when it was nearly a wilderness and started the first hotel where the Rapley house now stands. He kept this hotel for about 25 years after which he moved into Greenwood township where his death occurred. Deceased made no profession of religion but was a man of strictly honest and truthful principles. The funeral was held in the Mennonite church east of Yale and was largely attended. Rev. Lester Clark officiating. The interment was in Brockway cemetery.

OUR NATION'S DEAD.

Fittingly Honored With Appropriate Ceremonies.

The nation being in a fever of patriotic feeling, Memorial Day was observed this year with an added interest and enthusiasm. This beautiful custom of honoring our soldier dead has never before seemed to come quite so close to our hearts as has the day just passed when the entire country is moved once again with the spirit of war, although with one grand difference, we all stand united, the country is not divided against itself, with one universal uprising the whole country march together under the stars and stripes in the cause of right and humanity.

In Yale on Sunday a very interesting discourse was given in the M. E. church by Rev. Wm. Coulter, the Presbyterian pastor. The church was nicely decorated with plants, flowers and flags, and a large congregation, including the G. A. R. post, listened to the address. A male choir furnished some excellent music.

Monday was a most beautiful day—bright and perfect for the observance of ceremonies in memory of our noble soldiers. The G. A. R. post, and pupils of the school gathered at the school building about nine a. m. and headed by the Yale Cornet Band, marched to the M. E. church with flags flying to the breeze. Here the program given in last week's Expositor was nicely carried out, mostly by the younger pupils. Much pains having been taken to prepare this program, the songs, recitations, drills, etc., were extremely interesting to the large crowd present and were given and received with much spirit. The appointed flower girls, six in number, then made a presentation of beautiful bouquets to the members of the G. A. R., after which the line of march was taken up by the G. A. R., school children and citizens and led by the band playing martial music, the procession moved to Elmwood cemetery where graves were covered with bright blossoms and the sleep of the soldier may have been the sweeter for the load of perfumed flowers, God's messengers of love and hope.

In the afternoon the people assembled once more and listened to an able and excellent address from Dr. Smith, of St. Clair, and another from our citizen, Harvey Tappan. Both addresses were well received and merited the keen appreciation shown. Thus closed the day, the events of which will long live in memory's casket.
