## THE WAR IN BRIEF.

Historical Dates in the Conflict Which Has Just Ended.

Feb. 15—Battleship Maine sunk.  
April 22—Nashville fired First Shot of the War.  
April 23—President called for 125,000 volunteers.  
April 24—Spain Declared War.  
April 24—United States declared war.  
May 1—Battle of Manila.  
May 11—First naval engagement in Cuban waters, the Winslow fight.  
May 12—Bombardment of San Juan, Porto Rico.  
May 19—Admiral Cervera arrived at Santiago.  
May 25—President called for 75,000 more men.  
June 2—Lieut. Hobson sunk the Merrimac in Santiago harbor.  
June 10—Invasion of Cuba by American army begun.  
June 11—Battle of Guantanamo.  
June 20—Ladron Islands taken.  
June 22—Gen. Shafter landed at Baiquiri.  
June 24—Battle of Baiquiri.  
June 25—Sevilla captured.  
July 1 and 2—Battle of Santiago.  
July 3—Destruction of Admiral Cervera's Fleet.  
July 14—Santiago surrendered.  
July 25—Gen. Miles invaded Porto Rico.  
July 26—Spain sued for peace.  
July 31—First land battle in the Philippines.  
August 2—Arroya and Guayama, in Porto Rico.  
Aug. 6—Spain accepted peace terms.  
Aug. 12—Protocol signed.  
Duration of war, 114 days.

Spain loses Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Ladron Islands—a total of 49,087 square miles, with population of 2,325,000, not counting the Philippines, with area of 114,326 square miles and 8,000,000 population.

Trustees present—Carrier, Holden, McIntyre, Wight and Wharton.  
Moved by McIntyre and supported by Wharton that Wm. Cavanagh be appointed overseer of the laying and completion of water mains and the erection of the electric light pole line.  
—Carried.  
Moved by McIntyre and supported by Wight that the president appoint a committee of three to prepare a schedule of rates to be charged for electric lights and water. President appointed Wharton, Holden and McIntyre.  
Council adjourned.  
Grant Holden, Clerk pro tem.
