### Passed Away.

At six o'clock Tuesday evening, January 9th, 1900, at the residence of Andrew Depeel, Euphonia DeVinney died, after a week of intense suffering from pneumonia, aged 30 years. Euphonia was always called, was a favorite with the young people, a pleasant, most amiable young lady, but never in the best of health. Her parents both dying with consumption, she inherited weak lungs and it is probable her life would have been a short one at the most. At the age of three she went to live with her uncle and aunt Mr. and Mrs. Moses Hallead and after several years she worked in the families of A. W. Ferguson, E. R. Beecher and others, being always well-liked. For a year or more she has been in the family of Andrew Depeel, where she found a good home and where she was tenderly cared for in her sickness. Only one brother is left to mourn the loss of a devoted, affectionate sister. After a short service at the house by Rev. McCall, of whose church deceased was a member, the remains were taken to North Branch for burial.

As briefly announced in last week's Expositor the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Burton Meneray, died at their home in Pontiac Tuesday, January 2, 1900, at the age of 2 years, 10 months and 7 days.
