Might be Misleading.

To The Expressor:—

In last week's issue of your valuable paper under the head of "Savoy vs. Houghton" there appeared an article which might be considered misleading in some respects. This fact is undoubtedly due to the anxiety of the person furnishing the facts to make the finding of Judge Atkinson appear as a complete victory for the defense in the case. The finding of the court, which had not been exhibited at the time last week's article was written, reads in conclusion as follows: "I make this order without prejudice because I understand that the defendant is ready to execute a mortgage to the complainant for the purpose of securing a performance of the equitable intentions which can be inferred from the different papers, and the relation of the parties, and if such a paper is executed pledging the property to the complainant for his support and maintenance under any and all conditions, even though it should require its sale, and provide for his good care in last sickness, respectable burial, a reasonable monument for himself and wife, and then I think the bill ought to be dismissed in the usual form. It is my opinion that the litigation was instituted in good faith and that the defendant should pay the expenses of the complainant's witnesses and should pay out of the estate one hundred dollars attorneys fees to the complainant's solicitors and such a concession should be made in the decree or mortgage."

There had never been an offer on the part of Mr. Houghton to make a mortgage as the court suggests with the provisions stated in the finding or it would have been accepted by the complainant's solicitors. Their only object was, what the object of any reputable attorney should be, the best ultimate benefit of his client, and it is quite probable, in view of the foolish act on the old man's part of deeding his property to Mary J. Sleight, after suit was instituted, the complainant's interests will be best preserved by the carrying out of the decree of the court. The solicitors for the complainant are quite satisfied with the result, if the finding of the court is properly incorporated in the decree. We might add that the undersigned were the only local attorneys appearing in the case, the defendant being represented by Judge Stevens of Port Huron.
