CONSCIOUS TO THE LAST.

Had Asked for a Slight Restorative when he Passed Away so quietly there was scarcely a movement of the body.

London, June 19.—The death of ex-Gov. Hazen S. Pingree, of Michigan, which occurred at the Grand hotel at midnight, came wholly without warning to the watchers. There had been little noticeable change in his condition for a time and, except for the nurses, his son, Hazen S. Pingree, Jr., was the only one present. Mr. Pingree was perfectly clear-minded to the last and his end was apparently painless. He was propped up with pillows and had just expressed a wish for some slight restorative, when he breathed his last so quietly that there was hardly a movement of the body. His son noticed a wistful expression in the eyes, but he was unaware that the end had come, until all was over.

The actual cause of death was a growth in the intestines following attacks of peritonitis and dysentery, an old effect of the civil war.

In the afternoon Gov. Pingree was not aware that the end was approaching. He spoke very little beyond mentioning his desire to return home, being anxious to see his wife and daughter after his absence abroad.

The body was removed this afternoon to an undertaker's mortuary at Paddington, where it was embalmed and placed in a sealed casket. It will be transported to the United States on the steamship Koening Luise, which sails from Bremen June 22, via Southampton June 23.

County School Notes.

Nearly all the country schools have closed for the summer vacation.

A teachers' examination will be held in the Washington school building, Port Huron, Thursday and Friday, June 20 and 21, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Owing to the N. E. A. at Detroit in July and the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo there will be no summer school in Port Huron this season.

The books selected for the teachers' reading circle for the next year are Industrial Evolution in the U. S. by Wright; Psychology for Teachers by Morgan; Fanciful Tales by Stockton.

The annual teachers' institute will be held in Port Huron, August 5 to 14. Prof. C. T. Grawn, principal of the Mt. Pleasant Normal school will be conductor, Commissioner R. S. Campbell, assistant; Supt. W. F. Lewis of the city schools and Miss Abbie Roe, Ypsilanti have been chosen instructors.

The class of 1901 of the common school course consists of nineteen boys and fifty girls. Eighteen townships and thirty-four schools are represented. The township of Riley leads with nine graduates China and Grant following in the order named. Neat diplomas signed by the commissioner, director of the school district and teacher will be awarded. These diplomas will admit the holder to the ninth grade of the village or city schools or to the freshman class at the Agricultural College. The class motto is "work wins"; the colors, yellow and blue. Commissioner Campbell is preparing a dainty class souvenir for the graduates and teachers.

### That Poll Tax.

Some question has been recently raised in the village as to the power of the corporation to collect a poll tax. Attorney E. H. Drake has been requested by President Mann to prepare and submit opinion on the matter. As there has been more or less discussion over the question, the opinion will be of considerable local interest and is here given in full.

All male residents under 50 years of age and over 21, excepting those whom the statute specially excepts, shall be liable to assessment for highway labor or poll tax. Compiled Laws Sec. 4081.

The exceptions noted are soldiers, pensioners, paupers and incompetents. Also those who belong to any organized fire company, or who shall have been a member of some organized fire company for the term of seven years.

One of the powers given village councils by the village law of 1895 is to levy and cause to be collected each year, a poll tax, etc. C. L. Sec. 2854.

Assessors shall assess a poll-tax in villages, against every person liable therefor. C. L. Sec. 2859.

Assessors in villages shall apportion taxes and shall set apart in a column by itself a poll tax against every person liable therefor. C. L. Sec. 2865.

Section 2868 provides how the collection of a tax on real or personal property may be enforced during the life of the treasurer's warrant.

Section 2869 provides how taxes on real property, uncollected, may be returned to county treasurer and collected thereafter in the same manner as those returned by township treasurer.

Section 2871 provides that unpaid taxes against personal property may be collected by suit.

There seems to be no provision in the general village law for the enforcement of the collection of a poll tax, as the laws heretofore cited are the only ones mentioning poll tax and the methods of enforcing the collection of any kind of tax.

It is our opinion however that this poll tax may be collected by ordinary suit against the parties liable therefor and we quote the following citation from Dillon's "Law of Municipal Corporations."

Section 818, Vol. 2. If the charter gives the power to impose taxes, but is silent respecting the method for their recovery, the corporation may enforce them, or provide by ordinance for their enforcement by due course of judicial proceedings.

In such case the authority to collect by suit is clearly implied being necessary in order to make the power to tax available. The well known rule is, that where a statute creates a right, and gives no remedy, the party may resort to the usual remedy applicable to such a case.

The conclusion of the authorities examined is clearly to the effect that a poll tax may be collected by ordinary suit but not by distress and sale as provided for by the statute for collecting taxes of another character.

Smith, both parties being residents of Yale not long since:—"Mr. Wm. Smith and Miss Nellie Hebner were married in Onaway on Wednesday last. Mr. Jas. Morarity and Miss Minnie Trask "stood up" with them. Mr. Smith and Miss Hebner have been courting under more or less difficulties about six years, but finally have brought about the much desired union. Mr. Smith is the butcher and meat dealer of our village and will be one of our most influential residents. Miss Hebner is beloved by all who know her and will be a model helpmeet to her husband.
