Yale's Flax Industry.

A special bulletin has lately been issued by the commissioner of labor of this state in which he describes the extent and possibilities of the flax industry of Michigan, also other valuable information. For the benefit of many of our readers who may not be acquainted with a few of the facts concerning this industry we publish the article below:

"The flax industry, which was established in Michigan in 1888, is still confined to St. Clair, Sanilac and Huron counties. Jas. Livingston & Co. own and operate the entire six factories now in the state, using about 4,000 tons of raw material annually. Flax yields about two tons per acre and brings about \$10 per ton. The crop is not exhaustive to the soil, but the successful grower usually rotates with other crops. The bulletin of the labor office gives full particulars as to the cultivation of the crop and the method of handling it.

The flaxseed raised in the state is sent to Canada, where it is manufactured into linseed oil. The tow is baled and shipped to eastern cities, where it is made into coarser cloths, crash and toweling. The fine flax, or fiber, in bales of 500 pounds each, is shipped to the east, where it is made into the finer fabrics, linen and thread.

The factories in this state are located at Yale and Fargo, St. Clair county; Crosswell, Brown City and Deekerville, Sanilac county, and Pigeon, Huron county. The factories have on their payroll about 300 hands the year round, and during the busy season about 600 are employed. Experienced labor is paid about \$2 per day, the other employes averaging about \$1.25 per day.
