Whoever is responsible for this state of things should be notified and if the carcasses are not removed at once, the board should begin proceedings to prosecute. We are also informed that the creek is lined with dead sheep and other animals from Yale to the Lynn swamp. The health of Yale citizens is endangered, for whenever there is a fire in town the water from the creek is used. Our health board should act at once in the cases cited and hereafter use every effort to prevent filth and carrion being dumped into the creek.
