DEATH'S DOINGS.

Died, on Sunday, August 3rd, 1902, at his home in Lynn, Robert Guy, at the age of seventy-five years. The funeral obsequies were held in the M. P. church in Yale, on Wednesday afternoon, Rev. L. Clark preaching the sermon.

Robert Guy was born in the Isle of Wight, Sept. 1, 1827. In 1848 he was married to Charlotte Bell. In the early 50's they came to America and settled in Oxford county, Ont., afterwards coming to Michigan and remaining 27 years at Almont. From here they settled upon a farm in Greenwood and finally moved to Lynn where was his home when death came suddenly upon him, caused by heart failure.

Mr. Guy's life was one long, consistent, earnest trying to live God's way. He was a thorough christian, a member of the Protestant Methodist church and a popular and well known character as a local preacher.

To his first marriage five children were born, Alice, Mrs. Wm. Mulnyx, deceased; Harry, of Narka, Kan.; James, of Lynn; Maria, Mrs. G. S. Kimball, of Albion; Jesse, deceased.

The first wife dying he was married again and two daughters were born, Alice 11 years and Ruth 7 years.

The funeral services of Lulu Irwin, whose death occurred last week, were held from the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Irwin, on Monday, August 4th, 1902, at 10 o'clock a. m. Elder Lester Clark preached the sermon from Rev. 21: 4. "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain; for the former things are passed away." The remains were taken to Spring Hill cemetery, where the last rites were performed for the dead and the body laid to rest. Mr. and Mrs. Irwin and family have the sympathy of all in their sore bereavement.

The family of David Irwin desire to return their sincere thanks to all the neighbors and friends for the acts of kindness and sympathy bestowed upon them, and also the choir for their services at the funeral.

John Baxter, whose illness was noted last week, and whose death has been expected, passed away at his home in this village yesterday, Thursday, at about 8 P. M. The funeral will be held under the auspices of Yale Tent KOTM from the Church of Christ, Mechanic street, on Sunday at 2:00 P. M. Rev. Fournier preaching the sermon. Further particulars and obituary will be published next week.

William Meneray died of dropsy at the home of his nephew, D. B. Meneray, in Coleman on Friday, August 1st, at the age of 72 years.

Deceased was born near Dublin, Ireland, and moved with his parents to Canada where they remained several years. In 1854 the family came to Michigan and settled on Section 15, Brockway township—the farm now being owned by Jas. Boyce. He was a half-brother to Robt. W., of Melvin; Isaac, of Yale; Jacob, of Loomis; Martin, deceased; Joseph, of Saginaw; George, of Kilmaster and Mrs. Thos. Brown, of Shabbona. He had two full brothers, both of whom are dead. He never married.

Eli Chamberlain, a brother of the late Orin P. Chamberlain, died at his home in St. Ignace, Friday night last, at the age of 57 years.

Deceased will be remembered by the early pioneers of this township, having resided here many years ago.


