## EUGENE V. DEBS.

Opening Number of the Yale High School Lecture Course.

And there's 'Gene Debs, a man 'at stands, And just holds out in his two hands, As warm a heart as ever beat, Betwixt here and the judgement seat.

On Friday evening, Nov. 14, 1902, the opening number of the Yale High School Lecture Course will be given in Central Hall by Eugene V. Debs, the great labor leader who will lecture on the "Relation of Labor and Capital."

Just how deep seated is that which we call the "labor question" is one of the most difficult things to calculate. Mr. Debs gives two hours of remarkable discourse on the right and dignity of labor, and equality and justice among men. It is from the standpoint of experience that he speaks, he having been, as many will remember, the leader of the Railroad Strike in Chicago in 1894, and through this brought into much notoriety. He held the same position at that time that John Mitchell held in the recent coal strike.

President Garfield once uttered the epigram, that there is no dynamic force in the world comparable to an idea. Mr. Debs has the idea and knows how to bring out the dynamism and arouse the public conscience to a sense of the wrongs suffered by the masses of the people. As a lecturer he is one of the greatest on the American platform. He has so many invitations to come before the public that he cannot begin to fill them. Everywhere he goes, he is greeted by large and attentive audiences. One striking feature of these lectures is the large number of educators and students that attend them. Business and professional men and even labor managers of large concerns swell the multitudes that go to hear him. The reason is that he is a broad minded man and his lecture takes in every phase of the subject; he never abuses his opponent nor talks on anything but that which is of interest to the common people, and his arguments are so eloquent, magnetic and forcible that he always wins.

The work of Mr. Debs is so enormous that we cannot conceive of what he has done. He has wrought wonderful changes in the conditions of the labor classes and these changes have benefited nearly every American citizen. Everybody loves a man like Mr. Debs who is sincere and has the courage of his convictions. No more certain proof of the truth of this assertion was ever given than the esteem in which this man is held to-day. Even those who have frankly differed with him on economic issues, respect him for his honesty and admire him for his genius. Everywhere he has been, his path is well marked by the words: "Eugene Debs has come and gone, but he has left behind him an impression that cannot be effaced."

The lecture promises to be better than any we have ever had, and everyone should attend. You may never have the opportunity to hear this man again, and if you should miss it, it would indeed be a great loss. The small admission fee of twenty-five cents should enable everyone to come. Doors open at 7:30, lecture to begin at 8:00 p. m., local time.
