Death of Henry Griswold.

F. A. Griswold on Saturday last received a telegram from Guthrie, Oklahoma, announcing the death of his brother Henry, and in company with his wife departed Monday for Davisburg, Mich.

The remains of Henry Griswold reached Davisburg Tuesday evening, Nov. 25th, accompanied by his wife Elizabeth and son Charles, where they were met by brothers, sisters and friends. The remains were taken to the residence of a sister, Mrs. W. H. Hurt, at Andersonville, and the funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church, Wednesday. All that was mortal of a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father was laid to rest in Andersonville cemetery, where his father and mother are buried. His death was caused by uremic poisoning. Deceased was 54 years of age.

When a boy of 16 he enlisted (unknown to his parents) in the war of 1861, got as far as Grand Rapids, Mich., where he was taken sick with the measles, and thought back home by his father. After getting well he again went to Detroit and enlisted, this time succeeding in reaching the south, where he served until the conflict ended. The GAR Post, of Guthrie, attended the services held there. The floral offerings were very beautiful. Six of deceased's nephews were pallbearers.

The following clipping was taken from the Guthrie State Capital:

"The funeral of Henry Griswold will occur this afternoon at three o'clock from the family residence, at 214 North Second street, and immediately after the remains will be taken to the Santa Fe station for shipment to the former home in Michigan for interment.

Henry Griswold was one of the early settlers in Oklahoma, coming here soon after the opening and having remained the rest of his life. From the first he has been in business, as a liveryman and stock dealer, and in recent years with his son has owned and controlled the cabline. By all citizens he has been regarded as an excellent business man, honorable and honest in all his dealings. He has been highly respected at all times and his loss will be felt keenly by his many friends and associates.

Mr. Griswold's illness was of short duration. He was taken ill about two weeks ago and has rapidly grown worse having been removed to the hospital where he could be more directly treated. His death occurred shortly after eleven o'clock on Friday night. He leaves a wife and one son, Charles H. Griswold to mourn his loss."

The game was just nicely commenced when the Yale team disagreed with the judges in a decision and as arbitration was out of the question, the captain ordered the team from the field. The game was discontinued. After the Yale boys ate a hearty supper at Hotel Harrington at the expense of the home team they returned home."

The above is published in this week's issue of the Brown City Banner. In answer The Expositor wishes to say for our boys that so far as their conduct was concerned there was no need for arbitration. What the Brown City team needs, more especially the principal of the schools, is common decency and respect towards visitors. Besides, it would do them no harm to learn the rules of the game before playing with outside teams. Principal Sinclair, who, by the way, delegated himself umpire, lowered his dignity by slapping and otherwise abusing some of the Yale boys simply because they would not submit to his unfair decisions. Again, our boys paid for their own supper instead of the expenses being borne by the home team. The score stood 19 to 0 in favor of Yale.

The football game, which was slated for Marlette on Thanksgiving, was declared off on account of the snow and the unsettled condition of the weather.
