Louisiana Purchase Exposition.

The World's fair of 1904 at St. Louis will be approximately twice as large as any former international exposition.

The Centennial exposition at Philadelphia covered 236 acres, the Paris exposition of 1889-1900, 326 acres, the Columbian exposition at Chicago, 633 acres.

The world's fair at St. Louis will cover 1180 acres.

The construction cost of the Centennial exposition was \$8,500,000, that of the Paris exposition was \$9,000,000. The cost of the Columbian exposition was estimated at \$18,322,000 and the total cost was \$27,350,000.

The estimated construction cost of the St. Louis World's fair is \$30,000,000, and its total cost will be upwards of \$40,000,000 by the time the work is completed.

Before the exposition gates are open, the city of St. Louis will have expended the enormous sum of \$20,000,000. Of this amount \$5,000,000 was appropriated for the fair through the municipal assembly. Citizens of St. Louis raised \$5,000,000 additional by private subscription. By popular vote at a special election the charter amendments were carried, which will enable the city to expend \$10,000,000 for street paving and other public improvements.

The Thirty-Seventh

National Encampment.

The Thirty-seventh National Encampment, Grand Army of the Republic, which is to be held in San Francisco during the week commencing August 17th, 1903, is destined to become one of the most notable gatherings—in point of numbers, magnificence and splendor—in the history of California, as well as in the annals of the fraternity. The people of San Francisco, and of all California, fully appreciating the fact that these veterans may never again gather in an Encampment on the shores of the Pacific, will exert every effort to make this Encampment the most memorable one in the history of the G. A. R. No other organization holds the affection of the people as does the one composed of the veterans, the defenders of the Union, of liberty and right. The veterans residing in California and Nevada arranged the preliminaries for the Encampment, but all the people of California and of the Pacific coast are enthusiastic on that topic now, and working hand in hand with the committees to make this Encampment eclipse all former fraternal gatherings. From the governor of the state to the humblest citizen, every one is imbued with the idea that San Francisco and California must give the veterans the most rousing welcome they have ever had. Merchants, manufacturers, farmers, and miners, are all eager to make the visit of the veterans a pleasant and a memorable one. They are determined to show the visitors the famed beauties of this western wonderland, which must be seen to be appreciated. From every county and section of the state the choicest products will be brought to San Francisco, and be placed on exhibition, that the visitors may feast their eyes upon them. Carloads of fruit—the most delicious in the world—fruit-bearing trees, the giants of the California forests, and other wonders that have made the Golden State famous, will be on exhibition throughout the city for the benefit of those who cannot visit every section of the state. The famous gardens of Santa Clara, Marin, Sonoma, Alameda, Contra Costa and other adjacent counties will furnish the material for the grandest floral display ever seen. Quartz and hydraulic mining will be demonstrated on miniature mines, and oil wells are to be bored in the city, in sight of the visitors.

TO FURNISH DEER

For the Nimrod-Alger Man's Unique Scheme.

Houghton, Mich., May 26.—James Houghton, an Alger county homesteader, has devised a scheme which he thinks will prove profitable to him. He purchased a pair of snowshoes last winter with the aid of which he captured two young deer in the deep snow. He says he will thoroughly train them so he can start them from a certain point, and have them go over a runway, and then return to the pen. When the nimrods appear, for a consideration, he will agree to give them a shot at a deer, station them at points along the runway, and then go out to "scare up" the deer. One of the trained animals will soon appear, and the hunters will have their shot. He figures that the chances of the nimrods hitting the deer are about one in a thousand, and that one deer will probably last through the season. To be prepared for emergency he is training two.

All the hotels, lodging, boarding and apartment houses, have agreed to charge the regular rates during the Encampment. The railroad rates are the lowest for that occasion in the history of trans-continental traffic, and will include traveling over either route, coming and returning, with many side trips at a nominal cost.
