BLUE RIBBON MEETING.

Make Your Arrangements Now to Attend the Grandest Race Meeting of the Year.
As the racing season advances the trainers who have charge of the crack trotters and pacers are making ready for the grand circuit that opens at Detroit July 20. The Blue Ribbon Meeting at the famous Grosse Pointe track attracts the fastest horses in the land so that this great racing carnival never fails to furnish the best of sport. There are no other events along the grand circuit that attract the attention that the Merchants' and Manufacturers' stake for trotters and the Chamber of Commerce stake for pacers do. These two annual fixtures are the best known and most eagerly sought for of any in America. Since their inauguration both have resulted in some of the most brilliant battles ever seen in harness racing and the struggles of this year bid fair to outdo anything that has preceded.

Besides these two ever popular attractions, the programme is made up of all the high class events and the purses have attracted all of the leading stables of the country and the greatest meeting ever held is practically assured. It is rumored that never before in the history of the Blue Ribbon Meeting has there been such an array of speed as is now bottled up awaiting the tap of the bell. The amount offered in stakes and purses for the five days is \$44,000 and there will be five races each day.

No better opportunity for a visit to Detroit could be desired and every lover of the noble horse should take this advantage to see the champions and record breakers make their debut at Grosse Pointe.

Now that the entries have closed for the annual Blue Ribbon Meeting of the Detroit Driving Club on the Grosse Pointe track, July 20 to 24, the racing public is assured a week of rare sport. In spite of rain last month the horses have advanced well in their training and an unexpected number have come from all parts of the country to struggle for the rich stakes and purses that are to make the attraction at the Blue Ribbon Meeting.

From far off California have come the pick of Pleasanton and the other famed breeding establishments. Kentucky has sent an unusual number including all of her best ones. The eastern owners will make their first start at Grosse Pointe and Michigan, Ohio and Canada are well represented.

The feature, as usual, will be the Merchants and Manufacturers' \$10,000 stake race to be trotted on July 21 and there are 15 eligibles. The list includes the fastest of the green trotters. Horses that have never won but can step around 2:19 will score down for the word from starter Albert H. Merrill, of Danvers, Mass. There are 12 in the Chamber of Commerce \$5,000 pacing stake and some of these have the ability to reel off miles in close to 2:30.

From the first to the last race the programme is well balanced and the fields are generally large, averaging more than 13 to a race. Only fair weather is now needed to make this Blue Ribbon week another triumph for the Detroit Driving Club.

Table Mountain Ropeway.

Engineering Magazine: The ropeway located at Table Mountain is an important example of a line 5,280 feet long. It consists of a single fixed rope on which one carriage is drawn to and fro with an endless hauling rope, the driving gear having reversing motion so that the direction of travel of the carrier can be controlled. Commencing at sea level, and following the ground on posts spaced about 300 feet apart, the cable takes a span of 1,500 feet, rising to a projecting rock some 1,480 feet above the starting point. Resting on a support at this point, the cable again takes a span of 1,400 feet to an upper terminal 2,200 feet above the lower one. This ropeway has worked so satisfactorily that it is not only used for the carriage of materials employed in the construction of a reservoir but is at times used for passengers.
