PROPOSITION CARRIED

The Election Was Quiet and the Vote Small.

Monday, April 18, is certainly a lucky day so far as holding special village elections is concerned, for it was on that date six years ago the special election of Yale village was held and the proposition to bond for the electric light and waterworks system was carried. And we do not believe that there is a citizen of the village to-day who regrets the installing of said system. So we believe it will be six years hence with regards to establishing a sewerage system in our enterprising village. Yale has a voting population of about 275 or 280. Out of this number only 181 turned out and voted. We do not take from this that there was a lack of interest, for we believe everybody is interested in this movement. It is a step in the right direction towards improving the sanitary condition of our village. We come to the conclusion that "silence gives consent," therefore those who remained at home were in favor of bonding the village for \$8,000 for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a sewerage system.

The vote stood 125 for and 56 against the proposition. Just as soon as the preliminaries are completed work on Main street sewer will be begun.

Old Times in Dixie.

The last lecture of the season on the high school course was given in Central Hall Tuesday evening. The last, but by no means the least, as many gave it as their opinion that it was the best one yet. Opinions differ, of course, but Colonel Ham certainly did not lower the standard of entertainments which we have had this winter, one iota. The high class of lectures and concerts provided for Yale citizens' entertainment is certainly much to the credit of our teachers, and the large number who have taken advantage of the course have assuredly felt themselves benefitted, the high moral and uplifting atmosphere which has been breathed forth upon us by these noted speakers and the elevating influence of the power of music which has been ours to listen to has surely left a mark for which we will strive and not in vain.

The entertainments this winter have all been largely attended which goes to show that our citizens have that cultivated mind which appreciates and understands these good things. We have no doubt but as fine a list will be scheduled for next season and we shall all be ready for it with increased enthusiasm.

Mr. Williams was born in Warwick township, Ont., 70 years ago, and moved to St. Clair county, settling in Clyde township. On April 20th, 1854, he was united in marriage to Miss Sarah A. Gregory. Mrs. Williams is now 67 years of age.

Nine children—four boys and five girls—were born to them, all of whom are living, and who, together with a number of grandchildren and one great-grand-child were present, and all seemed bent on making this the most eventful day of the old peoples' lives.

An elegant repast was served and everyone present did justice to the good things spread before them.

The old couple were the recipients of numerous costly presents from their children, which will be fondly treasured during their declining years.

Warren is the Detroit real estate dealer and Warner the Oakland county farmer and butter maker who is the present Secretary of State.
