## THE FINEST IN THE TOWN.

The opening of Thos. G. Holden's new meat market has given to Yale one of the finest shops to be found outside of the large cities and our citizens are proud of this new addition to our business circles. Mr. Holden for years conducted a meat market here, but on account of ill health gave up his business for two or three years.

Last fall he commenced the erection of the brick structure which is now complete and open for trade. The building stands 60x18 ft. 3 in. with a 12 ft. ceiling. The front portion is large with ample accommodations for displaying stock and waiting upon the public. The racks for hanging are all of steel, nickel plated. The woodwork is of southern pine, finished in oil. The furnishings are all of the latest and most up-to-date makes. Back of the main room are the office, work room and refrigerator. The latter is 9x12 in size, a Brecht patent, which is an admirably working invention calculated to keep meat perfectly has been used. Four tons of ice can be placed at once. The front is ornamented with bevel plate glass and mirrors.

A gasoline engine will be used in the workroom to run the chopper and also to place the ice. The large show window is tastily arranged with bottled and canned goods such as are kept in the best meat markets and Mr. Holden's former reputation as a first-class meat market man will insure the public the knowledge that at all times will be able to find here the best of everything in his line with different varieties in season. We wish Mr. Holden and his son Bert, whom he has taken into partnership, a large measure of success.

Darwin Drake, a former resident of this village, died of pneumonia at his home one half mile north of Brockway on Tuesday, March 28, after an illness of only ten days.

The deceased had been in poor health for a number of years, but was fairly active for one of his age, being in his 70th year. He was taken down one week ago last Saturday and grew rapidly worse until the end came.

Mr. Drake's life has been one of great activity especially along educational lines, he having taught school in three different states. He was a member of the board of school examiners in this county for three years.

He came to Michigan from New York state about thirty-five years ago and settled near Goodells, being one of the pioneers of that section. He began farming and school teaching and since that time has been in close touch with the social, political and educational affairs of the county until a few years ago when his poor health crippled his activity but did not dampen his interest in all public matters. His later years were almost entirely devoted to farming.

He leaves a widow and two sons, E. H. Drake, of this village, and C. B. Drake, of Lewiston, Mich.

The funeral services were held at the house yesterday and the remains were interred in Elmwood cemetery.


