Items of Interest Taken From Our Exchange Columns for Exposition Readers

Cyrus Kear, of Inlay City, captured six skunks last Saturday, all out of one hole.

Cameron & Co. dealers in building material in Port Huron are bankrupt. Liabilities \$10,000.

A sale and supper held by the M. E. ladies of Marine City last week cleared them about \$370.00.

The Roseburg creamery which was recently closed, promises the patron of the factory 100 cents on the dollar.

The jurymen who are excused so often are objecting to being sent home every week unless they receive mileage.

Andrew Carnegie has given to Sarnia another \$5,000 for an addition to its library for which he gave \$20,000 before.

James Laidlaw, the boot and shoe merchant of Sandusky, sold his business last week to H. F. Congleton, of Ohio.

Fred Kempf, of Capac, who has built the miniature model city, has it on exhibition in Port Huron for a short time.

The new bank at Deckerville is a branch of the Farmers' State Bank in that place, of which Ira Arnot is president.

The salary of the St. Clair county new trustee officer has been fixed at \$3 per day and expenses while actually employed.

Michigan Christian Endeavor day has been set for March 11, 1903. The day will be observed by all societies in Michigan.

Robert P. Young, a janitor for 23 years in Washington school, Port Huron, has resigned because he is no longer able to do the work. He is 74 years of age.

B. F. Kessler, the contractor who has been unloading beets for the Marine Sugar Company, has skipped the town, leaving unpaid bills from \$700 to \$1,000.

Henry Pettis aged 58 and Mary P. Phillips aged 62 years, both of Riley township were recently married. Pettis has been married twice before and Mrs. Phillips once.

Eugene McCarthy, an old pioneer of the Wooden Track, died December 6, at the age of 93 years. He was born in Ireland in 1812 and came to Port Huron 40 years ago.

A number of buildings will be erected on Sugar Island by the White Star Line. A dancing pavilion with 2,000 feet of floor space will make the largest dancing pavilion in the state.

Port Huron's Chamber of Commerce is taking active steps to provide free dockage for vessel owners at Port Huron this winter. It is claimed that the business and profits will repay amply the expense.

In the case of Egan vs the township of Kimball no less than eleven cripples have been called as witnesses. If these are samples the townships of St. Clair and Kimball must have a lot of badly used up men.

It has been definitely decided that the tunnel under St. Clair river will be operated with electricity. A contract has been let to install a complete equipment to cost \$680,000. Power houses will be built at each end of the tunnel.

The First Congregational Church in Port Huron owns a 40-acre farm in the township of Kimball. None of the officers have ever visited it. It is said that only ten acres is under cultivation and the rest is under water most of the time.

Matthew Morgan, a Chicago traveling man, was held up at the tunnel depot at midnight one night last week and relieved of \$32 in cash. The transaction was made within one hundred feet of Chief of Police Malmes and Special Officer Howard, but neither knew of it.

We noted a short time since in this column that Fred Standel of Capac had had his legs crushed under a log train near Gaylord. The boy who is only 15 years old died in the hospital soon after and was brought back to his home to be buried. This was his first venture out into the world, and he went to earn money to help pay off a mortgage on his parents' farm.
