SPECIAL CITY ELECTION.

A special election for the purpose of voting on the question of bonding the city of Yale in the sum of eight thousand dollars to build sidewalks and crosswalks to be repaid by a general assessment of property of said city; and also the question of bonding the city for the sum of six thousand dollars for the purpose of building sidewalks, the same to be repaid by a special assessment of the property benefited by the building of sidewalks, will be held in the several wards of the city on Monday, July 30th, 1906, as follows: First ward at Reid's Livery office; Second ward at Council chamber in Rapley Block; Third ward at C. J. Holcomb's building. The polls of said election will be opened at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon and remain open until 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said day of election.
