R. E. Barr has installed a 3 1/2 horse power New Way Motor Co's gasoline engine in his blacksmith shop. This engine is constructed on an entirely new plan, hence the name. The cylinder is cooled by air which is circulated by a fan connected with the flywheel. An automatic device regulates the flow of gasoline to the amount actually required. Thus much gasoline is saved when the engine is not working hard. It has a reversible drive pulley which may be attached to either flywheel. One oil cup lubricates the whole machinery, the crankshaft running in oil. The sparkler is supposed to be one of the best made, being of the jump spark variety. The regular speed is 400 revolutions per minute, the variable 200 to 300. The engine is compact, but very powerful for its size. It was purchased of Geo. McIntyre.


