#### The Teachers.

The superintendent, N. J. Drouyor, has been at the head of the school for the past seven years. He is a man who is in love with his work, believes in it, and is untiring in his efforts for the welfare of the school. The high school has doubled in numbers since Mr. Drouyor came to Yale and the school has forced to the front all along the line.

Miss Ada M. Coleman, who has been principal of the high school for the past two years, is a graduate of M. S. N. C. and has been most efficient in her service. She goes to East Jordan next as high school principal at fine increase in salary. Mr. James E. Ryan, who has charge of the history and English and the Athletics of the high school, is a graduate of Mt. Pleasant and is more than making good with the boys. Miss Allie Maher, who has charge of the Latin and German department, is a graduate of M. S. N. C., though not a German by descent, she talks German well and has aroused a good deal of interest in her German classes. Miss Hattie Merrill, a Yale girl, is assistant in the history department.

We are doing departmental work through our 6th, 7th and 8th grades, for the last three years and find it a complete success. Miss Jane Moore, an M. S. N. C. girl, has charge of the seventh and eighth grade room and teaches arithmetic and reading. Miss Genevieve Rider, a graduate of the Western Normal, has charge of the sixth grade room and teaches history, civics, physiology and some reading. Miss Hazel Chase, a Mt. Pleasant girl, is the third teacher and teaches language and grammar and geography through the three grades.

Miss Eva Heaton, M. S. N. C., teaches the fifth grade and is to remain with us. Misses Edna and Ethel Miller teach the second and fourth grades, but have fine positions in the Grand Rapids schools and are leaving us. Miss Price, M. S. N. C., teaches the third grade and much to our satisfaction will remain with us next year. Miss Phebe Roy, who has been in the schools so long that children of parents who commenced under her, are now being taught to read by her. Miss Roy keeps up with the times and is doing excellent work. We use the Aldine method reader and Miss Roy turns out children who can read. Miss Florence Pierce is our kindergarten teacher and a visit to this department will convince any one that Yale knows a good kindergarten teacher. Miss Pierce is not only first class in her special work, but is a musician with power to charm and an artist of no mean ability. We have but one session a day of the kindergarten and Miss Pierce teaches drawing through the grades during the afternoon. Her work is hard but she is well paid, is hale and hearty, not fat and forty, and seems to enjoy it.
