It has been a number of years since Yale had a real old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration. We do not mean the old kind of a celebration but one of the safe, sane sort.

The Fourth falls on Sunday this year and we suggest something our little city has never had—a two or three day base ball tournament, starting on say the afternoon of the 1st and winding up on the third.
Yale has the timber for one of the fastest little ball teams in the Thumb and the boys are always ready and anxious to do their best but during the past two years have gone behind on account of lack of interest on the part of our citizens.

By giving a little support to our team when it is organized it will give the boys lots of encouragement and make them take more interest in the game.
We might also suggest horse races and other amusements during these two or three days, something that will bring the largest crowd that our city has ever entertained. Why not get busy and start pushing for a big three-day celebration.

We Rise To Remark

In an article last week entitled "Croswell to have day service," the Jeffersonian states: "Yale is getting equipment along the same lines and expects to make their electrical plant a paying thing for the city." We have been getting day service for about two years now and when we say day service we mean 18 and 19 hours out of the twenty-four. The published statement last spring showed a net gain of \$1928.19 and the year previous of \$1218.98 over all running expenses which also includes bond interest. A new electrical driven pump is now under construction and will be installed next month which will further cut our costs and this, with new business being taken on daily, should soon put us out of the "expectation class." Our financial report will be published again about April first and while we have no way of knowing at present what it will be, we will wager our delinquent subscription list against a ton of beet pulp that it beats last year.

Installed New Motor

Wharton & Co., our hustling elevator firm, is always on the alert to improve their plant and recent years have added up-to-date machinery to take care of the grain, hay and produce that comes to them from the farms around Yale. The latest is a new 10-horse Wagner motor which has been connected with the city current and is tearing everything loose in the shape of power and at a big saving over the gasoline engine previously used. The explosions in the third ward are now a thing of the past and all concerned are well pleased.
