

A New Industry For Yale

As soon as their new building is completed the Yale Company will become a permanent institution for our city, and will be engaged in the manufacture of Chemical Fire Engines. Their building, which will be located on the lot just south of Young & Son's livery, will be 40x60 feet in size with a large basement and will be constructed of cement, with a brick front.

On the start the company will only make one size extinguisher, the Jewel, which is described as follows: Horizontal 55 gal. seamless tank, lead inside and out; it is mounted on a tubular frame with 52 in. Sarvea patent wooden wheels, roller bearing. The tires are 1 1/2 x 3 1/2 in. round steel and the axle is of cold rolled steel, 1 1/2 in. with 7 inch drop. It has metal hand holds, rope eyes, tongue rest attached, ratchet rope reel with 40 foot Manila pull rope. The acid receptacle is a heavy lead bottle held in a copper cage, tinned. Has long flat blade which gives thorough agitation. The discharge is a heavy one-inch galvanized pipe. Brass drain plug and angle shutoff. Has light but strong hose reel. The dimensions are as follows:—Height over all, 4 feet 8 inches, width 4 feet, length 8 feet, track 38 inches.

The equipment furnished with each machine is as follows: Heavy brass nozzle; 2 nickel plated lanterns; 100 ft. best 3/4 in. chemical hose; light, strong well finished metal tool box; one 36 in. steel car bar with holder and one regulation fireman's axe with holder.

The brass work on the machine will be polished, and the color will be red, four coat work, lettered to order.

Thomas U. Wharton is at the head of the concern and informs us that while the building the company is erecting this spring is small, they will be able to supply the demand for a time, and additional space will be added as it becomes necessary to take care of the business.

The Expressor is always pleased to welcome new industries to Yale, and it is our earnest wish that the company may be forced to double its capacity in a short time.




