Patrick Herron died at his home two miles north and one mile east of Yale, on Thursday, March 25th, 1915, after a long illness, having been confined to his bed nine months. He was buried from Sacred Heart Church Monday at 10:30 a. m., Rev. Fr. Melling officiating.
Mr. Herron was born in Goiny, County of Kilkenny, Ireland, July 27, 1828, and came to Canada with his parents when seven years of age, settling in the Gore of Downie, near Stratford. In the year 1866 he was married to Mary Ryan of the same place.
In the year 1875 he moved to Michigan with his wife and four children and settled on a farm three miles north east of Yale. The country was new, not many settlers at that time. The land was heavily timbered and hard to clear, there being no sale for hardwood timber, but he succeeded in clearing a good farm which his son John lives on now, with whom he has lived since the death of his wife, nine years ago.
He is survived by seven children, Patrick of Capac; Mrs. John Paton, Speaker township; Mrs. Wm. Sheridan, Peck; John and Janice at home; Elizabeth, Detroit, and Richard of Greenwood, also 12 grandchildren.
The funeral was largely attended considering the inclement weather. He had a requiem high mass and was buried in Sacred Heart cemetery, Yale. Six of his old friends, Thos. Grady, Wm. Darling, Jas. O'Donnell, George Mann, Nicholas Furlong and Thomas McGrettan acted as pallbearers. The burial offerings were beautiful.
