Emmett Grants Two Licenses

At the meeting of the village council of Emmett Monday night two liquor licenses were issued and it is probable that some legal action will follow. Several weeks ago Prosecuting Attorney Stewart sent out notice to all villages and townships in the county to the effect that the Warner-Cramton law would have to be obeyed and in villages where the population was under 1,000, but one license could be issued.

The licenses issued Monday night by the Emmett council go to William Conger and Sylvester Kinney. Conger's license was issued first. Prosecuting Attorney Stewart said Tuesday morning: "I have been informed that two licenses were issued by the village council of Emmett but this I do not know for sure. I, however, do know this, that but one license will go into effect and that if a second license has been issued it will be contested under the Warner-Cramton law."
