

### Sam Bettes Heard From.

The following clipping is taken from The Sentinel, Missoula, Montana, dated July 29th:—

Rev. S. G. Bettes, known as the "Cowboy Preacher" made the announcement today that he would baptize all those who wished this coming Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The place chosen is on the Rattlesnake creek, just below the Pine street crossing.

Mr. Bettes wants to be understood clearly as to this baptism. The ceremony is not binding to any particular cult, and there is no effort to proselytize, nor to change the faith already established, but it is an opportunity offered to those who desire baptism at this time.

"The place chosen for the immersion," said the "Cowboy Preacher," "is one of great natural beauty and may be easily reached on foot and by automobile. The services are free to all and no charges will be made. This ceremony binds no one, but is a general purification for all those who desire baptism at this time."

Rev. M. Bettes is superintendent of the Free Will Baptists in 10 western states, and has aroused much interest in his work among those who have come in contact with him. He is working at present for prohibition and is planning a campaign for that cause, to begin Thursday of this week, if possible. The program has not been definitely settled upon, but will probably consist of street meetings by those who are forwarding the movement locally, assisted by Mr. Bettes.
