STATE TROOPS QUELL RIOTS

Ohio Militia in Charge After Great Damage Is Done By Strikers.

Youngstown, O .- Two companies of state guardsmen moved into East Youngstown Saturday to prevent a repetition of Friday night's riot, when mob of striking steel workers from the plant of the Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. looted and fired the business district, causing \$1,500,000 damage. One man was killed outright, 37

wounded and 87 rioters were arrested. The spirit of the 15,000 workers, thrown out of employment by the closing down of the tube plant and the works of the Republic Iron & Steel lo., due to the strike, was ugly. But Brigadier General John C. Speaks, commanding the 2,200 state troops rushed here to quell the rioting and restore order, gave orders to preserve peace at any cost.
