Work of County Agriculturist

Owing to the fact that no account of the work for the week ending April 22 was written, an attempt will be made to cover the next two weeks in this report. A review of the activities of this period shows that three main projects have claimed attention, the oat smut treatment campaign, boys' and girls' clubs, and the distribution of the beans and seed potatoes which were purchased by the St. Clair County Farmers' Federation last fall. Oat smut treatment demonstrations have been held on the farms of John Conroy and S. B. Barr of Brookway township; Charles Fenton of Casco; Clinton Fleming of Port Huron; and Wesley Stringham of Berlin. The work seemed to become increasingly successful as the campaign progressed, and the attendance and interest indicated that it was well appreciated by the people of the county. These meetings have been attended by a total of one hundred ninety-eight of the farmers of the county, and reports indicate that not only a large number of those present, but others who were unable to attend have treated their oats for the prevention of smut. These meetings have led to the making of many new acquaintances, and have extended the influence of the St. Clair County Farmers' Federation to a number of the best sections of the county.

The meeting of the China Farmers' Club was attended Wednesday, April 19, at the home of John Schroepel in China township where a talk on boys' and girls' clubs, and the treatment of oats was given. Later the men gathered at the barn for a dairy cattle judging demonstration. Another important meeting in that vicinity was held at the China Gleaner hall Friday evening. This was attended by about 40 persons and a good live boys' corn club consisting of nineteen members was organized. Both the China Corn Club and the Central Corn Club of Burchville are made up of wide-awake energetic boys, and the knowledge that the first two clubs in the county are of such character affords much encouragement. It is to be regretted, however, that it has not yet been found possible to interest the girls in this work. A few cooking, canning, sewing, or mother-daughter clubs would be of inestimable value to the girls, and would serve to cultivate a proper attitude toward the essential every-day affairs of life.

The greater portion of the week ending April 29th was devoted to the distribution of the seed potatoes and beans which had been ordered through the St. Clair County Farmers' Federation. The dividing up of a carlot shipment into small lots entailed considerable labor especially with the inconvenient facilities that were experienced in handling the job. This has led to dissatisfaction on the part of some, and the County Agent is rapidly coming to believe that his duty should end when he has shown a prospective buyer where a prospective buyer may be found, or vice versa, without assisting in making the deal. The beans and potatoes, however, were both found to be of good quality, and it is hoped that they will have an appreciable influence in relieving the critical situation caused by the disastrous season last year. 
