OUR SOLDIER BOYS.

Letters From and Items Concerning Yale Boys Who are in the Service of Their Country

Camp Eustis, Va., Nov. 5, 1918
Mrs. Dan Middleton,
Yale, Mich.

Dear Mother and all:--As I am waiting for the mess call I will write you a letter. I shall never forget our journey here. We crossed through the Alleghany and Blue Ridge mountains. It was sure some sight in passing through towns on the way. We saw scores of dummies. We passed through Stanton, President Wilson's birthplace.

There were one thousand boys on our train, mostly from Michigan. Two days and three nights were taken to make the trip and we were only too glad when we landed in camp.

We received our shots and believe me my arm is some sore, otherwise I am feeling fine. Many of the lads who came on our train are sick in the hospital. Am pleased I haven't had to be taken there. We sleep in tents and it agrees with me, I guess, as I've gained in weight since coming here.

How is Dad and Clarence coming with the plowing? Virginia is a fine state but Michigan for mine. This Co. went out to Camp Eustis three miles from Mulberry Island, the first of the week. We are on the Ammunition Train that is supplying ammunition to the boys at front. They say we will be about five miles behind the lines. I heard today that we would be ready for France in two or three weeks. All the lads are anxious to go across and I am one of them.

We've only had mail once. I was sure glad to get those letters from home. Our Corporal from Mulberry Island was here this morning. He said we had all kinds of mail out there. I hope Lulu has sent me some stamps as they are hard to get out here.

I have been transferred from Co. D to Co. C, that is why I haven't got my mail it comes in my old address. We have our new suits now. They are the overseas suits with small hats. They sure look fine.

Now, mother, don't worry as I'm all right and we'll soon have the kaiser's "goat." Well, I guess this will be all for now. Please write often and I will do the same.

Dear Friends: I find it one of the hardest tasks of my life in the army to write you regarding the death of your son, Lewis O. Weaver, who died in the hospital at Bakhariza, on September 15th of pneumonia. His illness started with Spanish influenza which developed into pneumonia. He died like a true soldier and as such received the military tribute which is due him. He is buried in a little cemetery only a short distance from where I am writing this letter.

It is a part of my duties to check up on the personal effects of those who die or are killed in action. I found among his possessions photographs of all those whom he held nearest and dearest--all of them personal friends of mine. These effects will all be returned to you eventually through government channels. I just wanted to write you a personal letter offering you my heartfelt sympathy and to let you know that your son died as he lived--a man.

Dear Sir:--From Yonkers, N. Y., a number of us were sent to Franklin Cantonment, a part of Camp Meade, Md. This is a signal corps cantonment. There is a great difference between life in a training detachment and life in camp. In some ways I like camp life better. A great many men from the main camp and a few from this are ready for overseas service and I expect they will leave before long.

Are You Loyal and Patriotic.

Wherever the English tongue is spoken, people know the meaning of "sportsman." "A fair field and may the best man win" is the supreme law of all our games and sports. And that law, observed as a matter of honor, on every baseball, football, cricket and lacrosse field, accounts in no small measure for the magnificent victories of the Allies on the western front. Our national sports have made us despise "quitting" and the "yellow streak."

The same code of honor holds with reference to Liberty loan subscriptions. And it has a vital element in addition--that of loyalty to Country and loyalty to the Army and Navy.

Every man, woman and child in America who subscribed for Fourth Liberty bonds on a deferred payment plan is in honor bound to live up to the terms of the subscription pledge. Nothing but "dire necessity," in the words of Secretary McAdoo can possibly excuse "quitting" and failure to carry through the plan. Make all payments, receive the Liberty bonds and hold them fast until the Government repays the principal.

This is a rule on the ball field. Fight for a fair hit. Run hard for the bases and the home plate. Work with the team. Fight down any selfishness. Combat any disposition to quit or accept defeat. Be honorable and play the game like a man.

This is the program that Liberty Bond Subscribers are in honor bound to carry through. No matter how much self-denial it may call for--no matter how hard the "scrapping" and economizing may seem--every subscriber is bound by the law of Patriotism, and by the "honor rule" of good "sportsmanship" to accept the sacrifices and make good the subscription pledge.

Any other course throws a burden on the government, and interferes with the best interest of the Army and Navy, and is a stain on one's personal self respect.

Be a good "sportsman." Be a patriot. Have "nerve." Pay for every Liberty bond you signed for.
