## OBITUARY

Charles Weymouth died at his home on Kennick street, Friday evening, Dec. 13, 1918, at 8 o'clock. Last summer suffered a slight paralytic stroke from which he partially recovered. On Monday, the 2nd day of December, upon his return from a visit with friends in the country, he was taken with another severe stroke from which he never recovered. From this time he gradually became weaker, being practically unconscious after the third day, until death came to relieve his suffering as above stated.

In the death of Mr. Weymouth Yale loses one of its old residents. He was born in Macomb county on May 1st, 1852. He was married to Eva L. Leovings, on the 7th day of March, 1875. Mrs. Weymouth died Dec. 19, 1899.

He resided in Saginaw county for several years and moved to Yale in 1886. With the exception of two years—from 1890 to 1892, during which time he managed the flax mill at Fargo, Mr. Weymouth has resided in Yale.

On March 6th, 1901, he married Mrs. Emma Berry, with whom he lived until his death. He leaves one son, Jay B. Weymouth, who has practiced law in Yale for the past twelve years.

The funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon and interment was made in Elmwood cemetery. Deceased led a life of activity, having followed the trade of carpenter and being engaged in the lumber business and farming at various periods. He was a man of sterling character, and made many friends during his life in this community, by whom his absence will be keenly felt.

William McCleery, a former resident of Peck, died at his home in Detroit on Wednesday, Dec. 18, 1918. He was found dead in bed when his wife went upstairs to call him for breakfast. Was fifty years of age, passing away on his birthday. The body was brought to Yale Friday last and funeral services were held in Sacred Heart church, Burial in Catholic cemetery.

Word has been received in Yale of the death of Mrs. Norman Menerey, which occurred at her home in Los Angeles, Calif., on Saturday, Dec. 7th, 1918, after a long illness. Death was caused from tuberculosis. She leaves a husband and two children. Mr. and Mrs. Menerey moved to California about thirteen years ago.

David Huffman, aged 35 years, died at his home 6 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Yale on Monday morning of this week. Death was caused from pneumonia, following influenza. He was not married, but lived with his mother. Another brother is very low with the same disease. Funeral was held from the home on Wednesday afternoon and interment in Elmwood cemetery.

Burton Mack, 25 years of age, whose home was 1 mile north and 1/2 mile east of Melvin, died Friday morning, Dec. 13th, 1918, from pneumonia, following influenza. He leaves a wife and three small children. Deceased was teacher in the school near his home.

The funeral services were held from the house on Sunday and interment was made in Melvin cemetery. Mrs. King Holden, Minnie and Mina Mosher went to Chicago last Saturday to attend the funeral of Esther Buck. Deceased was about 20 years of age and was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. U. G. Buck. She was only about a week, death being caused from uremic poisoning.

The bereaved relatives have the sympathy of all in their hour of sorrow.

Dear Sir:—Well, I am still in the same camp and enjoying the best of health. Most everyone here has had the "flu," but I have escaped it so far. Understand there have been a number of cases in Yale. Are there any at present? Most every one here has recovered and things are looking better at the present time.

I have received the Expressor each week and I surely enjoy reading it as it enables me to keep in touch with things going on at home, and I appreciate it very much.

We expect to be discharged from the service of Uncle Sam within ten days or so now as they are going to start demobilizing soon.

I will finish my course in Mechanics this week. It has been very interesting work.

We are drilling only one hour each day now, so have things much easier, although the drilling is fine, I think. I never felt better than I have since I have been here.
