HEAD OF O. E. S. OFFICES
MOVED TO LANSING

After being located in Chicago
for 30 years, the offices of the
right worthy grand secretary of
the Order of Eastern Star have
recently moved to Lansing. Mrs.
Minnie E. Keys, of Lansing, was

section.


Dan Leslie, of Decker, had a fine
