## NEWS ITEMS FROM NEARBY TOWNS

Thumb Tales Tersely Told—Interesting Items Gleaned From Our Exchanges

Capac school has this fall one of the largest enrollments in its history.

Christian F. Bach, millionaire lumberman and founder of the village of Bach, Huron county, died August 22nd.

Henry Ford's sea-going yacht, "Stalia," is anchored at Harbor Beach Resort while Edsel Ford and family are occupying the Ford cottage.

Silas Farrington died recently at his home in Allenton at the age of 94 years. He was a resident of Armada and Allenton the most of his life.

Twelve foreign residents of Port Huron and one of St. Clair, were naturalized as citizens of the United States at Port Huron last week.

Carl Olson, a pressman in the Bad Axe Tribune office, had his hand caught in one of the big presses last week, getting it badly crushed.

A couple of small boys, Hungarians, living near Kingston, were playing with a gun in the barn when it accidentally went off, shooting the younger boy in the breast, killing him instantly.

The people of East China have voted to build a new town hall to cost in the neighborhood of \$7000. It will be 30x90 feet in size and equipped with kitchen, smoking room, rest and cloak room and a large dancing floor.

The Commercial hotel at Richmond, which has stood empty since the state went dry, has been purchased by two public spirited Richmond citizens, who will convert it into an apartment house, to relieve the shortage of houses.

At the special election held in St. Clair last week, the people of that city voted 374 yes and 65 no to ratify the action of the Common Council to accept the offer of the Detroit Edison Company of \$42,000 for the city's Electric Lighting equipment.

Creighton Cathcart fell from the third floor of the Condensory plant at Cass City to the cement driveway, breaking one wrist, spraining the other and both ankles and receiving other painful bruises. It was almost a miracle that he was not killed outright.

Out of 165 gardens examined in Port Huron, John Schwikert, Jr., was awarded the silver cup given by the Federal Commercial and Savings Bank for the best garden plot in the city for a model garden. James A. Taylor gets the prize of five dollars for second best.


John W. Scully, whose death occurred at his farm home near Almont, was born in Brockway township, St. Clair county, in 1865, and moved away when he was eleven years old. He held many offices and had a very extensive acquaintance, and was a friend to all.

Joe Solley, a Hungarian beet sweeder, living on the Albert Protow farm southeast of Attica, found a dynamite cap, and not knowing what it was started in to investigate. Application of a hammer to the cap soon divulged the mystery, and the thing exploded, tearing off one finger and parts of two others and the thumb.

Mrs. John Weaver, 70 years of age, was burned to death Wednesday afternoon in the fire which destroyed her home in Arthur township, near Reese. The aged woman had left the building once but returned to get some belongings and was unable to get out again. The body was not recovered until after the fire was extinguished.

Two men, one colored, sawed their way nearly to liberty at St. Clair county jail on Thursday night. Sheriff Windsor became suspicious and investigation showed five bars in the window sawed apart and about two bushels of brick under the sill unearched and hidden from view. It is thought the saws were smuggled in to the prisoners.

Rev. William Rennie of the Free Methodist church conducted a street meeting on Saturday night preaching a stirring sermon.

Yale merchants were stocking up with an immense amount of goods which looked as though they were sure of a splendid trade.

The Yale school had an enrollment of 267. There were thirteen foreign pupils in the high room. Clarica Goheen was the editor of the school notes.

On September 5th the Yale Bryan Club held an important meeting with short speeches down on the program from those in sympathy with the club's aims and principles.

### GETS SENTENCE OF TWO YEARS

Ewart Sather, 22, whose home is near Detroit, was sentenced to serve from two to ten years in the state penitentiary at Jackson, with a recommendation of release at the end of two years on good behavior, by Judge Harvey Tappan in local circuit court Friday morning, for stealing an automobile belonging to Dr. Woodhull, of Marine City.

The theft was committed by the youth about three weeks ago. He stole the machine in Marine City and drove it to Detroit, at which place he was soon captured. He was brought to Port Huron and had since been in the county jail. Judge Tappan gave the youth a lecture on passing sentence upon him. He advised him to keep away from bad companions and to uphold his release from the penal institution. Should he maintain a good record at the prison the Judge stated he would get his recommendation for release at the expiration of the first two years of his term.

Reports From Department Gives Exact Figures as 1223 for 1920.

According to the preliminary announcement of the population for St. Clair county, as gathered by the census enumerator for the Bureau of Census last spring, the report shows that the city of Yale "stood still" in the matter of adding or taking away of residents. In 1910 the figures were 1223 and the same total was rolled up for 1920.

Brockway township decreased from 953 in 1910 to 871 in 1920; Lynn's population slumped from 818 in 1910 to 688 in 1920, and Greenwood dropped from 987 in 1910 to 910 in 1920.

The village of Emmett shows the biggest decrease of any of the villages of the county. The census of 1910 showed that 292 people lived within the corporate limits, but this year the enumerator could only list 175. Emmett township also shows quite a slump.

Every township in the county dropped off in population excepting Port Huron township which includes part of the village of Marysville. This is due to the fact that the high wages paid in the cities are luring the boys from the farms.

The report also shows that the population of the county has made a big gain since the census was taken in 1910. At that time there were 52,341 people here, and the last enumeration shows 58,043, an increase of 5,702 in the ten years.

### Can Shoot Deer From Nov 13 to November 22 In Michigan

Lansing, Sept. 4—The deer hunting season limits for the coming hunting period were fixed yesterday by the state public domain commission to run from Nov. 13 to Nov. 22. The open season this year covers both the upper and lower peninsula. State Game Commissioner J. B. Baird, says there was some differences of opinion among sportsmen as to the dates which should be adopted, but it was finally agreed that those dates give as late a season as possible and still get the hunters home in time for their Thanksgiving dinner.

### Former County Lady May Be State Senator

Mrs. Eva M. Hamilton of Grand Rapids, nominated Aug. 31 for State Senator over two male opponents, is a St. Clair county woman, having been born in Columbus township, and being a daughter of John McCall, of Memphis, a well known citizen of the county. Mrs. Hamilton has been a prominent suffrage worker. She went into the campaign in the sixteenth senatorial district against two former legislators, Martin H. Holcomb and Henry B. Vandercreek, both of whom had served in the lower branch of the legislature.

### SHOCKING ACCIDENT

A shocking accident occurred in Memphis on Tuesday evening which in all probability ends the life of Mrs. Gus. Pappas.

Mrs. Pappas had lighted a kerosene lamp and blew on the wick to make the flame brighter. The flame reached the oil, causing a terrible explosion which knocked the woman to the floor, covering her with the burning oil. Her husband managed to put out the fire on her clothing and about the room, but the body was so terribly burned that recovery seemed impossible. The couple have one small child.

This young couple resided in Yale last summer, the husband owning a big gravel truck and working a big road job near here.
