The Mountain View Orchard near Romeo, is producing 8,000 bushels of peaches this year.

While playing football, Howard Forrest, of Marlette, had the misfortune to break the bones in one ankle.

There are many cases of measles, whooping cough, diphtheria and scarlet fever in and around Marlette.


