## STATE NEWS

The city of Mitchell proposes to erect a \$30,000 city hall in the spring. The plan is to make it so that it will accommodate the legislature and the state officers temporarily in case Mitchell wins in the fight for the capital.

Day county will sell \$50,000 in bonds to build a court house this summer. The bonds run twenty years bearing interest at five per cent. Day county commissioners recently visited Aberdeen to inspect Brown county's new court house plans

Mitchell's Carnegie library building will be completed in the spring. An association has been formed to give a series of entertainments and provide other ways and means to provide books for the library.

The proposition for the city of Watertown to purchase the water-works there, owned by a private corporation, for the sum of \$80,000 failed by a vote of 185 to 306.
