



TEXT OF GERMAN NOTE AS RECEIVED BY RADIO REPORT London Wording of Hun Reply Shows Atrocities Denied, But Orders Given the Submarines Not to Sink Ships. LONDON, Oct. 22.—The text of the German note, as received by wireless, is as follows: "In accepting the proposal for an evacuation of occupied territories the German government has started from the assumption that the procedure of this evacuation and of the conditions of an armistice should be left to the military advisers and that the actual standard of power on both sides in the field has formed the basis for arrangements safeguarding and guaranteeing this standard."

AMERICAN FLYER DOWNS THREE GERMAN PLANES WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTHWEST OF VERDEN, Oct. 22. (By the Associated Press.)—Three German airplanes were brought down on Friday by Lieut. Charles M. Brown of Syracuse, N. Y. This was disclosed by further details received of the exploit of this aviator, who was reported to have brought down one Fokker on that day. This increases to 15 the number of German planes destroyed on Friday by Lieut. McDermott and the other American aviators who were protecting the plane engaged in the all-American bombing raid.

TEXT OF GERMAN NOTE AS RECEIVED BY RADIO REPORT (Continued) "The German government protests against the reproach of illegal and inhuman actions made by the British in land and sea forces and thereby against the German people. For the covering of retreat German troops will always be necessary and they are carried out so far as is permitted by international law. The German people are under most strict instructions to spare private property and to exercise care for the population of the enemy."

Foch Gives Credit To Lloyd George For Appointment NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Marshal Foch, generalissimo of the allied armies, replying to the felicitations of David Lloyd George on his sixty-sixth birthday on Oct. 2, gave the British premier credit for placing him in supreme command, according to the text of telegrams made public here by the British bureau of information.

CONSUMPTION OF FREE GAS TO BE LIMITED WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Free consumers of natural gas in Arkansas, Louisiana, West Virginia, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, New York, Oklahoma and California will be limited to 200,000 cubic feet per annum under an order issued today by the Fuel Administration in those states. In addition all consumers are asked to eliminate wasteful practices.

NAVY ORDERS CLOSE RECRUITING STATION The local navy recruiting office has been officially closed for the duration of the war as the result of a recent order issued from the navy department at Washington to the district headquarters in Nashville. All government property has been turned over to the Nashville office by Commodore Marvin Schmitt, who has been in charge of the office since the departure of Chief State Day.

FRENCH CAPTAIN DIES AT CAMP SHERIDAN MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 22.—The death of Capt. Gaston R. Cheno, a member of the French military mission assigned to Camp Sheridan, occurred here after an attack of influenza which developed in pneumonia. He was assistant to the major in command of the training mission, and served as infantry instructor.

CAPTAIN "FLU" VICTIM IN ALABAMA CAMP MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 22.—Capt. Emil J. Cohen, of the 45th Infantry, 19th division, training at Camp Sheridan, died after a siege of influenza-pneumonia.

PERSHING'S STEED BEING GIVEN BEST OF CARE MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 22.—The sturdy charger that bore Gen. James H. Pershing into Mexico more than a year ago as the head of an American army, is receiving due care and attention at Camp Sheridan.

HUN SHIPS ESCAPE. LONDON, Oct. 22.—Speaking in the house of commons, James Thomas MacSannara, financial secretary of the Admiralty, said there was good reason to believe that all German destroyers and torpedo boats which had their bases at Ostend and Zeebrugge had escaped to German ports.
