HEISMAN JUMP SHIFT UNIQUE

Worked With Remarkable Results by Georgia Tech.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 26.—How football formations introduced in the last dozen years have caused greater discussion than the "Heisman jump shift" which has been adopted by Georgia Tech since 1915, 1916, 1917 and 1918. There is nothing complicated about it. It is a simple matter of shifting the line of scrimmage to the right or left, depending on the position of the ball.

Explaining the play, Heisman said: "When the shift is put into effect, the guards, tackles, ends and backfield are removed from their normal positions and the line of scrimmage is shifted to the right or left, depending on the position of the ball."

"The beauty of that formation is that every conceivable play can be made from it. Georgia Tech has used it in all its plays from that formation—the backs, end runs, criss-cross passes and the like. It has been successful in every instance."
