

Offered To Locate \$38,000 For \$142; Is Now Locked Up

PINE BLUFF, Ark., Nov. 1. (Sp.)—Tom Green, a negro, formerly a proprietor of a grocery store in the west end of this city, Thursday was bound over to the grand jury by Municipal Judge S. A. Miller on a charge of grand larceny.

Green was arrested Tuesday on a complaint filed by Ed Fuller, who claims that Green had extracted \$142 in bills and silver by a promise to locate a treasure amounting to \$38,000, a diamond and two gold watches.

According to Fuller's story they went to a field in the southeast part of the city Friday night, and when they got to a certain place Green told him that that was the place where the treasure was buried, and producing a tin cup told Fuller to put his money into it, and when his pockets were emptied said "Run get a shovel right away before the spirit leaves me."

When Fuller returned with the shovel Green and the money had vanished. Fuller rents near Gordon, Ark., and had brought some cotton here and sold it.


ENSIGN FLYING VICTIM.

Wife Of Wealthy Gypsy Succumbs; Clans Will Gather

After an illness from pneumonia of less than 48 hours, Mrs. Babe Stanko, wife of George Stanko, wealthy Spanish gypsy, tenting at the end of the Jackson avenue car line, died at the Baptist Memorial hospital at an early hour Friday morning.

She was 23 years old and prior to marriage was of the Manekia tribe. Both Stanko and his wife were born in the old country. During the last six years, since their marriage, they have traveled over 20 states east of the Mississippi.

Pending word from Stanko, who has collapsed at his tented home, J. T. Hinton & Son, undertakers, hold Mrs. Stanko's body. It is the custom, when a death occurs in a gypsy tribe, for all clans to gather at a rendezvous and attend the burial, which is gorgeously prepared.

Mrs. Stanko leaves four children, the youngest, Annie, only four months old. Three tribes, including the Stanleys and the Harleys, are wintering on the present tenting ground, and all of them have been affected by influenza and pneumonia since their arrival in Memphis.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Discussing in the house of commons yesterday the position of British subjects in Russia, Lord Robert Cecil, assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, said the government is informed that the amount of bloodshed by the present government of Russia greatly exceeded anything that ever took place under the imperial regime.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—The strike called by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers to enforce an order of the war board for the reinstatement of 29 discharged motormen of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit company did not materially affect the operation of trains early today. It was estimated that about 20 per cent of the 600 motormen employed by the company on its subway and elevated lines had failed to report for work.
