PEACE PRELIMINARIES WILL BE ARRANGED IN PARIS

French Capital, Owing to Better Accommodations, Is Choice Over Versailles. Sitings Very Animated.

PARIS, Nov. 25. (By the Associated Press.)—The conferences on the preliminaries of peace probably will be held in Paris instead of Versailles, owing to the superior accommodations and conveniences in the capital.

Slated To Head Delegation TO SOVIETS

PARIS, Nov. 25. (Havas.)—Allied warships, the Boporus having been cleared of mines, have entered the Black sea and visited various ports from Varna around the northern coast to Novorossysk.

MINESWEEPERS LEAVE TO OPEN WAY TOEL

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A fleet of mine sweepers left the Fifth North Sea mine sweeper force in the night for the British squadron which is understood, will disperse in the morning to clear the way for the remainder of the fleet.

SOLDIERS' COUNCIL AGREEMENT AT BLIN

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 25.—Agreement has been reached between the German soldiers' council and the government, it is officially announced in Berlin.

CASUALTY LIST

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Two army casualty lists made public here today, together with Sunday's list, contain a total of 2,521 names, 411 died from wounds, 249 died, accident and other causes, 232 died airplane accidents, 183 died disease, 863 wounded severely, 799 wounded slightly, 291 missing in action, 212 prisoners.

VILLA FIRES TOWN
