FARM-LAND DRIVE**

Committees Are Appointed to Aid Soldiers and Sailors' Settlement Plan.

In an effort to attract as many soldiers and sailors as possible to Memphis territory under the soldiers and sailors' settlement work, and to carry on in the most effective manner possible the Memphis part in the plan as announced by Secretary of the Interior Lane, Frank Hayden, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce general committee, has named the committees which will have charge of the various departments of the work.

"If we are to have any considerable number of soldiers and sailors settled on lands in Memphis territory, it will be necessary to acquaint these men with the advantages of this section," declares Mr. Hayden. "With this in view, we will prepare literature and send speakers, if necessary, to the various cantonments to familiarize the soldiers and sailors with the exceptional opportunities offered throughout the Memphis territory."

G. F. Pittsburg heads the local publicity committee, with S. M. Williamson and C. E. J. Money as aides. J. H. Paine is chairman of the cantonment publicity committee, with George Morris, E. T. Leach and Dr. Tait Butler as commitments.

The land committee is divided into three sections: J. M. Goff, F. G. Barton, Lem Hank, E. Stonebraker, for Arkansas; John W. McClure, F. E. Stonebraker, Ralph May, H. W. Bailey, for Mississippi; A. L. Parkard, Millard Nall, F. E. Stonebraker and Henry Loeb for Tennessee.

There are also three sections for the state legislation committee: H. H. Wynne, H. B. Weise, A. C. Lange, Arkansas; A. E. Jennings, Calvey Crump, W. E. Hyde, L. M. Layne, Mississippi; J. A. Riechman, W. C. Early, Paul Dillard, Tennessee.

Chairman Hayden will announce the date for the first general meeting of the committee.

**43 DYER COUNTY BOYS GIVE UP LIVES IN WAR**

DYERSBURG, Tenn., Dec. 12. (Sp.)—A list of those from Dyer county who responded to the call of their country and made the supreme sacrifice shows 43 young men. Of this number 21 were killed in action in France, the remainder dying of disease. The majority of these young men were members of Company K, organized here by Capt. W. J. Green, having been at the front since the early summer. These young men were prominent in their communities, and their patriotism will receive recognition here by public-spirited citizens who will erect a monument to their memory.

A reception had been planned for the aviators by leading business organizations interested in the proposed air mail route between larger cities of the state. The aviators will spend Thursday night in Chattanooga and will get an early start for Memphis, being due at Park field late Friday afternoon.
