

The Memphis Red Cross canteen will make a merry Christmas for every soldier who happens to be passing through the city on Christmas day. There will be many who will miss connection with trains or who will not quite reach home on this day.

They are passing through now at the rate of 1,000 a day, an average of 200 detached and troop train loads a day. Mrs. W. S. Myrick, with members of her committee, have with a great deal of pleasure and love for the work, planned for Christmas day. Each canteen room will be brightly and artistically decorated in holly and cedar, where long tables are to be arranged which will be laden with good things prepared in the canteen kitchens under the supervision of the committee. Huge turkeys will grace the board, and a soldier boy will be asked to sit at the head and carve. A homelike atmosphere will envelope the rooms. A tree in each canteen will bear a gift for each man who enters from his train and passes the doors of the canteen. This department is very busy and will continue so until all the men return home from overseas.
