## GOVERNOR'S BILLS READY FOR FAULT IN LEGISLATURE

### No Junketing Is Planned for Present Session—Solons to Consider All Measures From Chambers at Nashville.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 27. (Sp.)—Gov. Roberts' hopes to have in the administration measures in shape for presentation to the legislature within the week, that is, if the gas house keeps their calendar free from clean. There have been so far some 10 or 12 administration bills with reference to tax reforms and economies introduced, and there are about that many more to come.

"The legislature has been entirely sober," said the governor, "and all are hard at work and prompt in their attendance, and I have seen much a spirit of patriotism and devotion to duty among any body of men so large as this is."

### Senate Bill 115.

Gov. Roberts anticipates little or no opposition to senate bill No. 115, which will be the subject of all open sessions of the joint finance, ways and means committee in the Tulane assembly hall Tuesday night. This is the bill which taxes certain corporations, formerly which now escapes without paying any all valorem taxes to the state, and includes such corporations as the express companies, the Pullman company and transportation lines, such as the Standard Oil, Swift, Armco, etc. It brings into one act a number of acts and amendatory acts, and simplifies and clarifies the law in respect to the assessment of railroads, telegraph lines, street railways, etc., and these other corporations which have heretofore been dealt with in separate acts, and in some cases without a proper method for taxation.

### No Junketing.

One of the features of the Sixty-first session of the general assembly in Tennessee will be the absence of junketing committees, which usually go on tour as soon as the recess begins.

"The legislature seems to be thoroughly committed to the abolition of junketing committees," said the governor, "and during the recess there will be no touring."

### Heads of Departments.

With respect to filling appointments in the various state departments, Gov. Roberts said he had given the matter much thought, and that he would not until his financial program and budget had been presented to the legislature, and they had built the foundation for the future sources of revenue for the state. "When this is completed," he said, "it will be soon my duty to take up these minor matters, but at present, however, I am not permitted to be drawn into any of these contests, and I don't care to participate in any of the controversies which may arise in connection with any legislation other than these remedial bills which are to be of such assistance to the state in her financial distress."

### ROTARIANS ENCOURAGE PIG CLUB CAMPAIGN

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 27. (Sp.)—The pig club work, as encouraged by the Rotary club here, through the agricultural agent in Knox county, has received much stimulus by the record of one boy of the Fountain City community, Norton Crane on May 20, 1918, secured seven pigs, which were valued at \$142 and bought a boar of the East Tennessee breed, which he is breeding grand champion with the best of all exhibits. This boy has won \$7 in prizes, \$42 being when his animals have been in competition with experienced farmers. He now owns animals valued at \$25. His total sales, prize winnings and value of animals on hand amounts to \$145. His cost for feed and care has amounted to \$15.60. He subsequently he figures his profit at \$129.40.

### DYERSBURG AGITATES BETTER ROAD SYSTEMS

NEWBERN, Tenn., Jan. 27. (Sp.)—At a recent meeting of the county court, which met at Dyersburg, resolutions were adopted to establish a better road here than was ever known in the history of the county. Special committees were present from the 20 districts of the county to represent the new system, and it is being established to comprehend better roads throughout the route of the Paducaan Memphis highway that passes through the county. Glen R. Metcalf, who was for several years county auditor and who was appointed to the position of county auditor in this county, has been appointed to the position of county auditor in this county, and all over the county has been practically selected and work will resume on the roads for the ensuing year. The public roads are now in a bad condition and local route carriers state that it is almost impossible to travel over them.

### SHORT COURT TERM.


### STILL HANDLES LIQUOR.
