EXPRESSMEN'S UNION TAKING STRIKE VOTE

ST. PAUL, Jan. 31.—Taking of a strike vote throughout the country has been started by the Expressmen's Union, it was stated here by Eugene J. Gordon, of Louisville, chairman of the executive committee of the organization, who announced today the vote of the St. Paul and Minneapolis branches in favor of a strike. The men are said to be dissatisfied with the action of officials who remain as holdovers from the staff of the privately operated express companies in opposing the unionization of the employees. Calls for strike votes among the 500,000 employees in other cities were mailed from here today, Gordon said.

They Want Some Changes Made in Bill Pending in Legislature.

Memphis Had Big Per Cent Of Possible Sun

The weatherman's reputation as a weather prognosticator has been on the subject of much adverse discussion, but the job now is open for someone to attack the column of figures contained in the annual meteorological summary issued by S. C. Emory for the year of 1918, which is due off the press. In the first place, Mr. Emory says Memphis had 25.8 hours of sunshine during the year, which was 61 per cent of the total number of hours possible for the sun to shine.

NEW YORKERS BUY NOTED PAINTING IN ENGLAND

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Whistler's famous painting, "Lady Mearns," has been purchased from the family of Lady Mearns in England for \$200,000 by a firm of New York art dealers, it was announced here today. The portrait was painted shortly after Whistler returned to London from Venice in 1856, and it is considered one of the most important of the full-length portraits by the artist.

1,500 MILITARY PRISONERS STRIKE AT ARMY PRISON

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Jan. 31.—More than 1,500 of the 1,576 prisoners in the United States disciplinary barracks here, where fire Wednesday night destroyed a quartermaster storehouse, with a loss estimated at more than \$100,000, refused to leave their cells yesterday or to perform any labor. About 2,000 prisoners signified their willingness to carry on with their daily routine. Prisoners cited by the prisoners are being heard and investigated. Col. Sedgwick Rice, commandant of the disciplinary barracks, said last night. He said that the prisoners complained that they were forced to work in the storehouse under terms more than others convicted for the same offense, and that the recent release of 100 conscientious objectors under orders from the war department also was resented. Col. Rice said that the prisoners who refused to work complained that the conscientious objectors were tried and sentenced under storehouse conditions that prevailed in their court-martials, and that they had as much right to be honorably restored to duty and discharged as did the conscientious objectors. The commandant said that there had been no outbreak and that no violence was anticipated. He said the situation was well in hand and that the grievances would be investigated and that the matter probably would be finally disposed of in a court of law. He added that the refusal to go to work could not be termed "a mutiny." Col. Rice said that he did not think there was any connection between the fire that damaged the storehouse in the disciplinary barracks inclosure and the "strike."
