## PROBABILITY OF SUBMARINE AS WARSHIP IS PROBABLE

LONDON, Feb. 3.—The abolition of submarines as warships may be decided upon by the league of nations committee during the coming week, according to the Paris correspondent of the Mail. It is said that the views of the general understanding reached during the conference Friday between President Wilson and the league of nations committee, Lord Robert Cecil, and probably will be proposed among the first plans of the platform and the league of nations during which it is hoped the league's constitution may be definitely formed.

Some of the submarine might be used defensively between the three great powers of territorial waters, but the over-riding sentiment was that the U-boat must be abolished. "After scrapping the submarine," the correspondent says, "it is understood that the economic weapon take the place of all other weapons in future wars. It is expected that the league will endeavor to work out a scheme by which the armaments of all nations will be gradually curtailed to a point decided upon as being necessary for defense. The league will try to arrange this early enough to insure that the financial savings thus gained will pay the interest on the world's war debt."
