At this particular time, on the eve
of the Junior Beethoven club's most

Mrs. Napoleon Hill and Miss Martha
Trudeau felt the need of bringing the
young people of Memphis together in
a musical atmosphere, and out of this
thought, after much effort, they orga-
nized the Junior Beethoven club,
which is a branch of the senior club
which bears that name.

Mrs. Hill was the first president and
held that office for six years, during
which time the interest and enthusiasm
in the organization increased so rapid-
ly, that very soon, in place of the few
young people who belonged at first,
over 100 members were enrolled.

The meetings were held in the parlor
of Mrs. Hill's handsome then home on
Madison avenue, where the young
musicians studied the lives of the
masters of all nations, and learned to
play their best selections.

Miss Sallie Leake assisted Mrs. Hill
in her work, and was quite an inspi-
ration to the class, which consisted of
both boys and girls, as it still does.
Mrs. Hill is an ardent lover of music,
and about 10 years ago she gave a

house party, to which all her old school-
mates were invited.

Her guests were entertained with a
beautiful musical by the Beethoven
club. The Juniors attended in a body
and showered Mrs. Hill and her guests
with flowers. Each junior member
brought a beautiful wreath of chrys-
anthemums, with which the guests were
crowned after an impressive little cere-
mony.

And now, at the age of three score
years and ten, the proud mother of
three splendid children and 10 grand-
children, Mrs. Hill may enjoy the ben-
efits of the splendid things which she
has accomplished, the results of which
she is justly proud, as all organizations
in which she has been interested, and
those which she founded, have de-
veloped into large bodies of enthusiastic
workers, who earnestly strive to live
up to the high ideals of their founder
and leader.
