CLUBBOM

WOMEN MAY VOTE, AND THEN LUNCH.

The Nineteenth Century club committee and representatives from all women's organizations in the city who have been engaged in the campaign to secure funds for devastated France, will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce teams at luncheon Wednesday at 12:30 o'clock.

Miss Augusta Semmes, chairman of the women's committee, has arranged so that all members of the Nineteenth Century club who are on the women's teams may go to the Chamber of Commerce luncheon at 2 o'clock and vote Wednesday morning for the officers and board of directors of the club.

All women are urged to do this, and to attend the luncheon, fully prepared to give their reports up to date, before the Chamber of Commerce teams.

French Fund Groups.

Nearly yet have the clubwomen of Memphis closed their hearts to the plea for aid from other women and children. No matter how far or near the call for help, their response is always prompt and generous.

The Nineteenth Century club committee, headed by Miss Augusta Semmes, and composed of splendid women from 17 women's organizations, who have worked tirelessly for several days to secure the sum of \$15,000 for the sufferers in the regions of devastated France, have reported up to date their amount secured \$15,000.

This is a splendid amount to have been secured by the women alone, particularly when one considers the many discouragements which have had to be coped with. Inevitably German propaganda and reports circulated by small-minded German sympathizers, to the effect that France does not need money or aid, and that the money is not used for a worthy purpose, have had their effect on a few people who are too selfish to pause and reason how untiresome such reports must be. France, after four years of war and untold suffering, of devastated regions, where homes have been wrecked, and lands ruined by shells and poisonous gas, where women and children are starving in the shattered little huts which once were homes—France certainly needs aid, and deserves it from all the world.

The committee for devastated France is not asking for funds with which to rebuild homes, but only for a reasonable amount with which to purchase rakes and hoes and other farming implements, so that the people may raise food for themselves.

At a meeting of the Nineteenth Century committee Monday afternoon the team captains made splendid reports of the amounts which they have secured. Probably the largest reported was Mrs. R. P. Lake's committee, with a total of \$700; Mrs. Robert Taylor's committee, \$600; woman's committee, national council of defense, \$200; Young Ladies' institute, \$150.

Miss Semmes, who has worked tirelessly to make the campaign a success, is very grateful to each and every woman in the drive for her splendid efforts and co-operation.

Doubtless when the Chamber of Commerce teams make their report at the luncheon of the two committees Wednesday, the \$15,000 goal will have been reached. However, if the report does not show that amount, the drive will continue until it is secured.

"It must go over," said Miss Semmes—"so go it must, in spite of German propaganda, April showers and other small matters which block the way."

HOPEFIELD POINT CRUMBLING FAST

C. of C. Wants River Commission to Hold It and Bank Below Beale Ave.

Immediate action on the part of the Mississippi river commission to repair the revetment work across the Mississippi river at Hopefield point will be requested by the Chamber of Commerce when the commissioners arrive on their annual tour of the river Thursday. The C. of C. request will be made by the community building committee, headed by C. C. Hanson and the traffic and transportation committee, headed by H. L. Mallory.

The condition is said to be serious at Hopefield point, as there is a likelihood of the swift current cutting away the revetment work until the water may push through into Hopefield lake. It would be doubtful if engineers could repair the current to its present channel. Prompt aid will also be requested in repairing the banks below Beale avenue on the river front, which are being undermined by the current.

The commissioners are making the trip aboard their own steamer, the Mississippi.

VICTORY SQUARE BILL PASSES LOWER HOUSE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 15. (Sp.)—The bill providing a \$60 bonus for soldiers, sailors and marines who served in the world war failed in the senate for lack of a constitutional majority. The house passed the bill providing for a victory square, a state, county and city memorial to be erected on the Capitol boulevard at Nashville. Nashville and Davidson county will raise \$1,000,000 and the state will pay \$1,500,000, the total cost of the project being figured at \$2,500,000.
