

"ASPIRIN" WAS TALCUM POWDER

Heavy Sentence Imposed on Manufacturer of Tablets.

 NEW YORK, December 31.—Accused of having manufactured and sold to influenza sufferers thousands of boxes of aspirin tablets, principally composed of talcum powder, Joseph M. Turkey, head of the Veranda Chemical company, of Brooklyn, was found guilty yesterday of violation of the sanitary code and sentenced to three years in prison with a fine of \$500. The sentence was the most severe ever imposed in the country for such an offense.

EXPECTS TO SOON STAMP OUT STOCK TUBERCULOSIS

Within a few weeks Dr. C. A. Sayre, of the United States bureau of animal husbandry, expects to complete tuberculin tests of every dairy herd in Shelby county, a task in which he has been engaged for the past six months, with headquarters in Memphis.
 If he is given the proper co-operation by the owners of herds, Dr. Sayre expects tuberculosis among the cattle to be stamped out in the county within the next 12 months. He found in making his tests that but one-half of one per cent of the native cattle is infected with tuberculosis, but that vigorous action had to be taken against the herds imported from the North, which showed a tuberculosis percentage as high as 25 per cent.
 Dr. Sayre condemned many of the Northern cattle, and hopes by testing suspicious herds within 90 days after the first test and enforcement of the quarantine, to stamp out the disease. He expects to continue the work throughout the state and then the South.
 He recommends through the Chamber of Commerce farm bureau that imported cattle be segregated from the native herds for at least 30 days after their arrival so that their true condition as to tuberculosis may be ascertained and the danger of infection to native herds eliminated.
 Dr. Sayre finds that the South has been much impeded upon by dishonest Northern dealers, who frequently drugged cattle to be shipped into the South, so that the temperature went up and the tuberculosis test did not reveal the tubercular condition.

PLANS TO HOLD SALE OF PURE-BRED HOGS

The organization of a sale of pure-bred hogs from the boys' pig clubs in Shelby county may be undertaken later in the season by S. J. Abernathy, district agricultural agent for West Tennessee, through W. M. Landess, county

agent, and M. B. Brock, pig club agent. The success of a recent sale of pig club pure-breds in Madison county by Mr. Abernathy and Judd Brooks, agent of that county, has suggested to Mr. Abernathy the feasibility of holding similar sales in the larger counties of the state. Fifty-two head of these pure-breds were sold in Madison county at an average of \$75 a head, the sale bringing over \$4,000. The sale was held in Jackson.

AVIATORS ENJOY MUSICAL PROGRAM

The Park field soldiers enjoyed a splendid musical program Tuesday night, given by Mrs. Katherine Scherer Jones and Mrs. Alida Black.
 These Tuesday night programs were kept up all during the war, and will be continued as long as Memphis entertainers can be found who will go. And when it is remembered that the boys who are left at the field are among those who went to help America win the war, that it fell to their lot to stay and maintain the post until after the treaty of peace is finally signed, it is seen that they are entitled to the same degree of attention that was given to them while the war was on.
 Mrs. J. G. Bailey is arranging the programs, and will appreciate the co-operation of readers and musicians, both vocalists and instrumentalists.

GIRL OF 13 KILLS MAN; IS HER SECOND VICTIM

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 16.—Ursula Broderick, 13 years old, who Sunday shot and killed her stepfather, Joseph F. Woodcock, has been ordered held for the grand jury by a coroner's jury which investigated Woodcock's death when he attempted to attack her.
 Three years ago the girl shot and killed her father, Joseph F. Broderick, but was exonerated when it was adjudged she fired at him to protect her mother.

APPROPRIATIONS CUT BY \$200,000

State Solons Hurriedly Plan Calendar for Last Day's Work of Session.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 16. (Sp.)—With only one day left for real action, the general assembly today cleared the way for adjournment Wednesday night. The senate and house adopted the conference committee's report on the general appropriation bill in which both houses receded from many amendments to the original measure. As finally adopted, the bill remains cut to the extent of about \$200,000 from the amount it contained when the houses first got its hands on it and started the pruning that ended in a row and subsequent conference on the measure.
 The senate disposed of the miscellaneous appropriation bill also with only a few amendments to the original measure. One of the principal additions to the bill was a provision for the appropriation of \$150 to each member of the general assembly for stenographic fees. This makes an increase of \$15,000 in the bill.
 An effort was made to cut the geological survey \$12,000 per year, but after squabbling, the amendment was killed and the appropriation remains the same.
 The Stockard road bill was reconsidered upon request of the governor in a special session of the assembly today. It was remedied in order to make it valid.
 The bill to allow horse racing under the pari-mutuel betting system was again considered and failed by a vote of 41 to 29. This bill was known as the "bread and butter" bill.
 The night session was taken up in the passage of local bills.

GOVERNOR CONSIDERING WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE BILL

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 16. (Sp.)—The governor had not signed the woman suffrage bill last night. Owing to the question raised as to the validity of the measure, it is not known what action will be taken by the solons in the current session. The bill is not expected to be passed until the next session.
 The bill as it now stands is claimed to be invalid on account of a provision being made for separate ballots and a restraining order is all that is necessary to prevent the women from voting until the matter is entirely cleared up, according to those familiar with the measure and the provisions of the general election laws of Tennessee.

TWO TENNESSEE BOYS DECORATED FOR VALOR

WASHINGTON, April 16. (Sp.)—In the name of the president, the chief of staff of the army announced today that distinguished private crosses had been conferred upon Privates Henry Johnson and Herbert Mitchell, of Company G, 13th infantry, for extraordinary valor at Bellefontaine, France, Sept. 27, 1918.
 Private Johnson, whose home is at Creston, Tenn., received the cross for killing the members of a machine gun nest, and Private Mitchell, whose home is at Jackboro, Tenn., received the decoration for routing two machine gun nests and capturing three prisoners.

THREE MEN ROB BANK OF \$22,000 IN BOOTY

MUSKOGEE, Okla., April 16.—Three men drove up to the State bank of Stratford, Okla., yesterday, compelled Cashier Allen Snoddy to unlock the safe, imprisoned him in the vault and drove away with \$22,000 of the bank's funds and \$1,000 worth of Liberty bonds. It was an hour later, when the day's first customer entered the bank, that the alarm of the robbery was given.
 None of the bandits was masked and so deliberately did the work that people looking through the bank's windows did not suspect anything was wrong.

MORE MEMPHIS TROOPS WILL SOON LEAVE CAMP

Three hundred and forty-six Memphis soldiers of the 30th division were discharged at Fort Oglethorpe Wednesday at Jackboro, Tenn., and sent here over the Southern railway about noon Thursday.
 These men are a part of the 1,225 Tennessee troops to be discharged at that time, 740 of whom will be handled by the Southern railway over its Knoxville division to Chattanooga and points in Eastern Tennessee, and the remainder will go to points in the central part of the state on the S. & T. P. and Tennessee Central railroads.

All the workers and all the newspaper men are up in the air for a name for the whimper, which is also of the French Renault type.
 Fred D. Bencke, director of publicity, after tearing out handfuls of hair, believes someone in Memphis has a tortle enough brain to think of a name for the baby.
 According to Frank W. Robbins and Thomas Odwalt, sergeants in charge of the tank, she is a female tank, so the name must be female. Thus the tank's name is a female. This tank is the pet idea of Mrs. Sam H. Phillips, chairman for Tennessee in women's work in the Victory Loan drive, to name the tank "Billy Bacon" in honor of Shelby's doughty artillery commander. But it's not that kind of a tank.

Sergeant Robbins explained the anthropomorphic tendencies and characteristics of tanks to a News Scimitar reporter Wednesday. Those with machine guns only are female. Those carrying guns of heavy caliber, as do the heavy tanks with three-inch guns, are males. They are given names, sometimes by conformity to their gender. KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 16.—J. F. Snodgrass, manager of a large wholesale and retail drug establishment here, has surrendered to federal authorities on a warrant charging him with conspiring to violate the Harrison anti-narcotic act. A federal agent, who represented himself to be a drug addict, bought narcotics amounting to \$400. It is alleged, when Snodgrass was present in the drug store.
 Dr. H. T. Nielson and E. L. Carpenter, who were arrested earlier, are charged with being parties to the general conspiracy. They are being held in confinement in default of \$10,000 bond. Snodgrass pleaded not guilty when arraigned with him and released on a \$10,000 bond to appear at a preliminary hearing.
