

GRAND JURY MAY UNCOVER MORE WHISKY SALES

Indictment of Two Patrolmen May Lead to Discovery of Men Who Have Robbed Freight Shipments.

The indictment of two patrolmen by the grand jury Tuesday may lead to the discovery of the identity of men who robbed a number of freight cars of whisky shipments during March.

The patrolmen, P. W. Worley and D. E. McClannahan, have made bond and stand suspended from the force until their trial has taken place.

They were suspended by Commissioner Miller two weeks or more ago, after the facts as to the robbery of a carload of whisky shipped over the N. C. & St. L. road became public.

Miller reinstated them two days later, saying that he could find no evidence to connect them with the robbery. The indictment charges them with conspiracy to break into and rob a boxcar, at the time standing on the tracks of the N. C. & St. L. railroad near Main street and Calhoun avenue.

The whisky was in an auto on Calhoun avenue, nearby. The railroad agents returned some time later and then found a dozen men unloading cases of whisky from the boxcar. The bandits were armed, and exchanged shots with the railroad agents, who fled and reported the matter to an official of the road, who notified the police department. The whisky was gone, as were the men and automobiles when the railroad special agents returned with reinforcements.

Several days later some of the same liquor was located by policemen in a store nearby and the owners of the store, were arrested, indicted and the bone dry law. They have not been tried.

Not After Small Fry. The failure of the grand jury to indict several negroes, who were arrested while loading liquor from a place on Front street a few days ago, caused some comment. The police at the time asserted that the auto into which that liquor was being placed when the negroes were caught, was the property of R. C. Rafter. It was also alleged that the liquor was in a building said to be owned by James Kinnane. The United States marshal, with several deputies, accompanied by city detectives, had seized a quantity of liquor in another building, also said to be owned by Kinnane, a half hour before the police arrested the negroes, and seized 145 cases of liquor in half-pint bottles.

No record of any attempt on the part of the police department to connect Kinnane with the raid has appeared on the records of the police department or has been presented, it is understood, to the grand jury. The present grand jury has found a number of indictments against alleged bootleggers, and has been trying for months to connect some of the wholesale liquor dealers, the men who bring the booze into Memphis in large quantities, with the illegal whisky traffic, but without result. The grand jury has ignored a number of bills drawn against negroes who have been caught by police with a half pint or a quart of liquor, unless the police department would co-operate in the attempts at law enforcement by trying at least to

WASHINGTON, April 15.—March was the first month in which a decided decrease in army expenditures occurred, an official statement issued today showed. In that month expenditures were \$494,000,000, or just 88 per cent of the previous monthly average. Of that total, the quartermaster corps spent 71 per cent.

HUN SOVIETS WILL SEND UP NATIONAL DELEGATES

LONDON, April 15.—A Berlin dispatch, filed in that city on Sunday, says that the soviet congress in session there passed a resolution providing that the central council elected by the congress will be authorized to elect members to the national chamber of workers, which will include the representatives of the nation's economic and creative forces. The system is based on the principle, it is said, that the forces of production should determine the policies of the government.

MILLIONS ARE LENT TO FARMERS IN MARCH

WASHINGTON, April 15.—During March \$12,848,000 was loaned to 4,430 farmers by the federal land banks on long time first mortgages, according to the monthly statement of the farm loan board. Loans closed by banks included: Houston, \$1,838,000; Louisville, \$1,146,000; St. Louis, \$1,122,000; Columbia, \$923,000; New Orleans, \$741,000. On April 1 the total amount of mortgage loans closed since the establishment of the federal land banks was \$158,609,000, with 79,949 borrowers. Altogether 185,843 have applied for loans under this system, aggregating \$492,066,723.

FARMER RETURNS HOME

NEWBERN, Tenn., April 15. (Sp.)—After seeing hard service in France for many months, Benjamin McKnight, prominent Dyer county farmer, who was severely wounded in action at the front in France, has returned to his home at Cool Springs. Young McKnight reported that he was confined in an American hospital for months where he suffered considerably from the effects of wounds he received in action.

COURTS CHANGE TERMS

UNION CITY, Tenn., April 15. (Sp.)—Judge Thomas Harwood has interchanged courts with Chancellor Hal Holmes for the purpose of trying a case here involving a large tract of land in the northwestern part of the county, consisting of several hundred acres of land and timber. Chancellor Holmes was disqualified, so he made the change and Judge Harwood is trying this land suit here.

TWO SHIPS BRING YANKS

NEW YORK, April 15.—The steamship Calumet arrived here today from St. Nazaire with 2,273 officers and men, more than 2,000 of whom are members of the 3rd division composed of western troops. The Calumet arrived later from Bordeaux with 1,355 troops, largely of the 4th division, also a Western organization.
