C. OF C. PREPARES FOR BIG ELECTION

Nominees Will Be Announced Thursday and Election Is Set for Saturday.

The Chamber of Commerce is in a fever of preparation for the most eventful two days of its year—Thursday, the day for the announcement of nominees to the electoral offices, and Saturday, the day for announcement of the successful candidates.

The respective announcements will be made at a buffet supper and smoker at 8 o'clock each evening. The balloting for the election will continue Saturday from 10 a. m. to 7 p. m., and the election officials hope to announce the new slate of officers at seven o'clock an hour later. The announcements will be made by Judge J. M. Greer, who has officiated in this manner until it has become a fixture.

In addition to the announcement of the nominees, the Thursday evening meeting will be devoted to the reading of the annual reports of the retiring president, K. S. Slaughter, and of the chairmen of the various committees which carried on the varied operations of the chamber during the year.

The reports will be read by Mr. Salisbury, and will be from the following committee chairmen:

Industrial, E. C. Klabber; publicity, Tom Sherron; convention, B. S. Parker; auditorium, W. C. Duttlinger; bureau of farm development, Charles J. Haase; traffic and transportation, B. L. Mallory; banking, L. C. Humes; community building, C. Hanson; education, Dr. A. A. Kincannon; entertainment, Jack W. Gates; foreign trade, Joseph Newburger; good roads, Thomas B. King; house, J. M. Walker; law, H. H. Barker; membership, Prather McDonald; music, E. R. Barrow; sanitation, W. C. Johnson; industrial welfare, John B. Edgar; and soldiers' placement, Earl Palmer.

The election committee, composed of W. C. Johnson, Frank N. Fisher and Sidney M. Neely, past presidents of the chamber, has been busy for the past few days counting the nominating ballots which are coming in from the members in great number. Following the announcement of the nominees Thursday evening, Friday will be a day of hot campaigning among the 2,000 members by the support of the candidates. This is expected to bring out a large vote. Fourteen hundred voted in the election last year, but W. H. Hayley, secretary, anticipates that this will be exceeded by several hundred.

The officers who will retire, in addition to the president, are M. G. Evans, first vice-president; John T. Fisher, second vice-president, and L. C. Humes, treasurer.

HELENA PROTESTS RAISE IN LUMBER FREIGHT RATE

HELENA, Ark., April 23. (Sp.)—Lumber dealers and mill men of Helena and vicinity are protesting against the proposed plan of the railroad administration to raise the freight rate of lumber 1 cent over the present figure. A delegation of Helena citizens was successful in securing postponement of the advance for 30 days to enable the shippers to prepare and file a protest with the government. The new proposed rate, they claim, would amount to approximately \$7 a car and would give Memphis a 2-cent rate to the shipping territory affected. Helena is claimed to be the second largest lumber market in the world, shipping out 38,000 cars annually, 75 per cent of it going into the territory affected by the new proposed rate.

NORMAL SCHOOL NOW HAS MUSIC

C. C. Hanson, in behalf of the state board of education, presented the West Tennessee Normal School with a phonograph. Mr. Hanson, Illinois Central railway agent, is a member of the board of the state board of education, has been instrumental in having one of these machines presented to each of the three Normal schools in Tennessee.

Shupe had the liquor unloaded and held for government authorities. It was valued at \$200.


