

UPHOLD BELGIUM IN HER DEMANDS

BRUSSELS, May 5.—Replying to an address presented by delegates of patriotic societies yesterday, Burgomaster Max said Belgium had been painfully surprised by the fact she had not been granted the "moral reparation" she had expected in the choice of Brussels as the headquarters of the league of nations. As to Belgium's other claims, the burgomaster said she did not hold out her hand for aims, but asked just payment for the damages she had suffered. He feared, however, that the work of the peace conference would prove that in the settlement of the international relations, justice had not absolutely "conquered the ideal of the empire. Nevertheless, he deprecated giving way to an impulsive gesture of irritation, for if all of Belgium's aspirations could not be satisfied, important concessions were assured.

The burgomaster of Antwerp was likewise called upon to speak by the participants in a big demonstration there. The official made a patriotic address to the crowd. Telegrams were sent to Paul Hymans, foreign minister at Paris, and to Premier Delacroix. At Ghent there also was a demonstration and the burgomaster was mandated an address signed by representatives of all political groups to be transmitted to the Belgian delegation at the peace conference.

Preparations For Tri-State Fair To Start On Thursday

Plans for the greatest of all Tri-State fairs are already in the making, though the tremendous annual exhibit of the industrial, agricultural and domestic achievements of West Tennessee, Arkansas and Mississippi is yet months in the future. A meeting of the fair directors has been called by Senator Frank D. Fuller, secretary of the fair association for 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon on the second floor of the Commercial Building. At this meeting the business of constructing for the amusement features, such as bands and vaudeville shows, will be brought before the directors. In this connection a meeting of the amusement committee has been called for 2:15 o'clock preceding the directors' meeting, to outline plans for the big show in order to present recommendations to the directors.

CHANGES ARE MADE IN ST. FRANCIS JOURNALISM

FORREST CITY, Ark., May 5. (Sp.)—A \$15,000 corporation formed here the past two weeks has taken over the plants of the Forrest City Times and the Forrest City Herald and the merged publications were issued for the first time this week under the caption of the Forrest City Times and Herald. Stock in the new printing corporation was sold to a number of citizens of this city and county, and in the election of officers of the new company, John T. Dural, who holds a majority of the stock, was chosen president, while Col. Ed Landvoigt, former owner of the Times, was elected vice-president and placed on the board of directors, and Mrs. Jennie H. Dural was assigned to the post of secretary-treasurer. Following the consolidation of the two city papers, E. T. Altman and Chas. R. Izard, former employees of the Times, entered the field by re-establishing the Crowley Ridge Chronicle. First published here by Izard on March 11, 1905, and discontinued Oct. 10, 1914, and the Chronicle re-appeared this week as a four-column folio.

DYERSBURG IS TO BUILD \$100,000 M. E. CHURCH

DYERSBURG, Tenn., May 5. (Sp.)—The trustees of the Methodist church here have purchased a large lot from Col. Tom W. Neal on which they will erect a handsome church. The consideration for the lot was \$15,000. Work will begin on the new church very soon, and when completed it will be one of the finest in this section. The church will also erect a new building and parsonage. The church will cost about the same as that of the Methodist congregation. The present church will be dismantled.

HUN MINE SWEEPERS LAID UP; COAL GIVES OUT

BERLIN, May 5. (By the Associated Press)—The German mine sweepers which have been repairing the fairways leading to the North sea ports used by the American food ships, have been forced to quit operations because of a coal shortage, a committee of the Prussian diet has been informed by Food Commissioner Schmidt. The outlook for the immediate future as regards the food question, however, is not unfavorable, the commissioner stated, as the supplies that are coming in are permitting of the gradual amplification of the official ration.

TEXAS SOLONS MEET.

AUSTIN, Tex., May 5.—The 36th Texas legislature convened in extraordinary session today to consider the enactment of legislation that would permit discharged soldiers to vote in the constitutional amendment election on May 24 and in all subsequent elections this year without payment of poll tax.
