RUSSIAN WILL FALL IN NOVEMBER

Says Former Officer of Imperial and Kerensky Regimes Visiting Memphis

"European nations will be put to the necessity of the card system of rationing bread so long as the Bolsheviks remain in control of Russia," declared Lieut. Alexander Malachoff, of Moscow, formerly aide-de-camp to the commander-in-chief of the Second Russian army under both the imperial and provisional governments in the world war. Russia is being the greatest wheat-producing nation in the world. Europe has to depend upon her for bread, as such, but under the chaotic conditions which accompany the Bolshevik regime Russia can not produce enough wheat to fill her own bread basket. "Even the United States can not supply the deficit," he added.

Lieut. Malachoff made this statement to The News-Scimitar Tuesday, seeking to show the interest which European nations are bound to feel in the overthrow of the Russian Bolsheviks. The Russian officer is in Memphis visiting several friends, whose acquaintance he formed while they were visiting in Liverpool and in his own country before the war. Prior to the war he conducted a cotton factory in Moscow and this connection brought him in contact with Memphis cotton people on business abroad.

Lieut. Malachoff is an uncompromising anti-Bolshevik, and a member of the Russian committee in Finland, which is dedicated to the overthrow of the soviet regime and the institution of a stable government in Russia. He predicted the collapse of the Lenin-Trotsky organization by November of this year through internal rottenness and the external pressure of the military movements against it. These movements are as follows: "The Russian and allied drive by the Archangel government in North Russia; the army of Gen. Denikin in South Russia or the Caucasus; the Siberian army under Admiral Kolchak; the contingent under Gen. Udenitch from Finland.

Lieut. Malachoff escaped from Bolshevik Russia without passing under the coup of the Kerensky government, when the officers of the old army were courted with the option of joining the red army and fighting the allies or facing a firing squad. The credentials upon which he secured passage to America were issued by the Finnish government.

"The Russian anti-Bolshevik people are now experiencing from the Bolsheviks much worse oppression than they had to endure under the czarism," said Lieut. Malachoff. "No Russian is secure even in his own home, and is perpetually liable to proscription, arrest and conviction without trial, by the soviet government, or proletarian dictatorship, not only in the vast majority of the Russian people. It is now being bitterly hated by the vast majority of the Russian people. It is now on its last legs and the impending revolution of the all-Russian government, with headquarters now located at Omsk, will speedily put an end to it."

Asked when he expected to return to Russia, Lieut. Malachoff said, with a shrug of his shoulders: "When the Bolsheviks are put down. If they fall today, I go back to morrow." While in this country he is looking out for the possibility of resuming the importation of cotton as before the war, when conditions will permit.

Both a limited monarchy and republic are favored by the supporters of the all-Russian government, Lieut. Malachoff said. "For the intelligent masses a republic would be preferred," said he, "but for the vast uneducated masses and by reason of the general chaos of national Russia, a limited monarchy and by reason of the great favorably regarded."

Clearing skies, both in the Memphis district and up-river points, together with the prospect of seasonable warm weather predicted, will keep the river below flood stage, according to S. C. Emery, river forecaster. Evaporation caused by the warm sunbath will be a small factor in the decrease in the rise, according to rivermen. There is a good amount of water to come down the Mississippi from the Ohio and other swollen tributaries but a stage in excess of 34 feet, instead of the 25-foot flood stage predicted within a week's time, is likely to be the maximum gauge.

The Mississippi river reached a stage of 33.0 on the Memphis gauge Tuesday, rising from 32.0 at the same hour the day before. There has been little interruption of activity on the river since the suspension of work by United States engineers which may be held up a little longer than anticipated by Maj. John Hodges, U. S. A., in charge of the Memphis district.
