**\$3,000 WORTH OF BOOZE SEIZED AT CLARKSDALE**

CLARKSDALE, Miss., June 7. (Sp.)—On Delta avenue, one of the main streets of the city, \$3,000 worth of blind tiger booze was broken up by Deputy Sheriff Talbirt, Taylor and Harris. The figures are based on a price of \$1.00 a quart, the demand for the usual bootlegger, and there having been 300 quarts smashed. This lot of booze was taken a day or two ago by deputies in a night raid on the place of business of an Italian fruit dealer, which was broken up by the police.

At the time of the seizure, the barrels marked "apples" and "oranges" were broken up by the authorities received from the warehouse of the shipment. From the streets where the bottles were broken, the whiskey ran into the Sunflower river via the sewer route.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., June 7. (Sp.)—Sergt. Alvin C. York today accepted an invitation of Gov. Roberts to go to Nashville, where he and his bride will be guests of the governor and the Nashville Rotary club. He stated today to a staff correspondent that further than this he had no definite plans, but that he expected to get busy doing something to advance the cause of Christianity and to do good in the world.

Sergt. York went to Jamestown Friday, where he personally procured license to wed Miss Grace Williams Saturday. He was still as calm and deliberate as when he nearly annihilated an entire German battalion single-handed.

**FOUR MORE MINE BLAST VICTIMS DIE OF WOUNDS**

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 7.—Four deaths of injured miners in local hospitals has brought the death list of the disaster in the Baltimore tunnel up to 81. Fifty other men and boys who were burned or maimed are at the hospitals or their homes, and the condition of nine of these men is practically hopeless.
