division in billets a considerable distance south of the Marne. The objective of the Third division was the south bank of the Marne, facing Chateau Thierry, where it was to prevent the Germans from crossing the river.

On June 1 the marine brigade of the Second division reached Montreux aux Moines, a dozen miles west of Chateau Thierry, and at 1 o'clock of that afternoon, at the urgent request of Gen. Foch, the 26th Infantry, the French corps, the Sixth Marine regiment moved out on the Chateau Thierry road and took position some six miles west of Chateau Thierry, in Clermont woods. French troops were in line still farther back to the east, but the Sixth machine gun battalion was used effectively on that day.

At the same time the Seventh machine gun section of the Third division brought up to the south bank of the Meuse in automobile trucks, arrived in time to cover the retreat of the French infantry from the north and prevent the Germans from crossing the river.


